Following the tumult of the prior season, the 2020/21 Surf Lifesaving season saw some degree of normality return for the Clubs in the Sunshine Coast region. While the season started under the cloud of COVID-19, generally all proceeded as normal and our Clubs and volunteers, once again provided first class service to the communities they support. Pleasingly, it appears that we will be able to return to the normal annual recognition of season achievements at Club, Branch, State and National level. I wish to extend my deepest congratulations to all those from our Branch whose achievements have been recognised with a Branch Award or a nomination as you will see in this report. I, and your colleagues, rightfully celebrate your success.

The goal of Surf Lifesaving Sunshine Coast is to save lives and to protect our local community and visitors to our region particularly between the 'red and yellow flags'. During 2020/21, there were, once again, no lives lost between the flags. However, tragically, there were an historically high, nine drownings on our beaches reminding us of the need to be ever vigilant and always strive to improve our performance as individual lifesavers, Clubs and as wider organisation. Analysis of these tragedies will inform decisions on resources and equipment to enable even more timely and efficient responses in future.

Our communities entrust us with great responsibility and respect. This trust requires us to monitor and review our operations, to recruit and retain the best people, to support and develop those members' skills and knowledge and to continuously grow as a strong and sustainable organisation. We must not be afraid to innovate in the pursuit of even better outcomes across every aspect of the movement. This is a theme that the Sunshine Coast Branch at many levels has been advocating for on behalf of both members and Clubs and we will continue to do so.

Every weekend and public holiday from September to May our active volunteers perform an incredible number of hours, in addition to the many extra hours given by our Operations support services; RWC, Duty Officers, Surfcom and After-Hours callout crews. Similarly, the safe beaches we enjoy are only possible due to the network behind the scenes; our trainers and assessors who spend countless hours training, assessing, developing and mentoring our members. The awards and skills gained don't just count between the red and yellow flags; they also make a difference in the community, giving our members life-long skills to help others in need.

We were also fortunate to complete a full surf sports season in 2020/21, in which our competitors, as usual, performed at a very high level and in good spirit. The Sunshine Coast Branch Championships were keenly contested again with a good turnout. Well done to all who took part and to the Alexandra Headland Club for winning the

Champion Club title. The Sunshine Coast Branch Titles are perhaps the only such titles that have continuously been run for well over 20 years uninterrupted and remain well supported. Many thanks, of course, to our officials, team managers and water safety crews. Long hours are put in to showcase our great athletes and to provide the Sunshine Coast community with high quality events. Of course, this year culminated in a very successful Australian Titles hosted by the Maroochy, Alexandra Headland and Mooloolaba Clubs. Our Branch will continue to innovate in carnival formats and events to lead the movement forward. Unfortunately, the Sunshine Coast representative team was not able to defend the Interbranch championship title by the narrowest of margins. What would have been the 13th consecutive year was unlucky for us! However, the team's performance was outstanding across the board and every single competitor, team manager and coach should be proud of this great legacy and record.

The membership development initiatives on the Sunshine Coast remain the benchmark for the movement. Camp Commando, PULSE Advanced Lifesaving Program and the Lifesaving Development Program offer great opportunities for Clubs within the Branch to develop young leaders in our Clubs and the local community. I was privileged to present the Awards at the end of Camp Commando this year and was astounded by the teamwork and support that this very large cohort of our young members displayed. These development programs identify amazing capabilities in our members and the Branch remains proud of this ongoing commitment to our members to deliver these programs annually. The benefits of developing our youth are also recognised by outside organisations, such as Defence Force Recruiting, who continue to support these programs annually.

Our Directors, Officers and Boards work hard to maintain high standards and to build their teams for the future, all to ensure best practise operations across all the portfolios. The Branch Council and Executive share the view that the broader surf lifesaving movement needs to be more open to new ways of doing things, embracing new technology and adapting to different attitudes and lifestyles of younger generations. This year, myself and the Executive have been active in pushing for reform, particularly in the areas of volunteer training and in the conduct of surf sports carnivals. I am hopeful that we will see further initiatives and improvements in the coming season. The Branch is also advocating for increased emphasis on "volunteerism" within our movement. Indicative of this, is the incredible efforts of a wide range of members in seeking to launch a new SLSC at Peregian Beach after a hiatus of nearly a decade. Hopefully, this new Club will be fully independent by the 2022/23 season. I wish to formally acknowledge the efforts of the Noosa Heads SLSC in maintaining surf lifesaving services at this location and in providing the support and impetus required to launch a new Club.

Our Branch Council (all 14 Club Presidents) holds years of experience, both within lifesaving and from the professional world and every councillor has contributed strongly. I extend my thanks to each of you for your support over the year. I am confident that you will continue to achieve great things within your own Club and also collaboratively with the Branch for years to come.

To the Branch Executive; Tim, Peter, Sebastien, Narelle, Santo and John - thank you for your commitment and dedication to your roles and the support you have provided. Next season will see some significant changes to our office bearers due to the retirement of Sebastian (Director Lifesaving), Santo (Director Surf Sports) and Narelle (Director Membership & Youth Development). As would be expected of such committed individuals, all will retain an active role in supporting new incumbents into each critical role. I particularly pay tribute to Santo who has filled the current role for 14 years.

This region is very fortunate to have a diverse and professional team of both Branch and SLSQ staff. The Regional team, capably led by Aaron Purchase, are committed to providing a high level of support to our Branch and Club Officers as well as seeking to work within the guidelines of SLSQ and SLSA. This season also marked the departure of Tanya Duncan as Branch Administrator after 18 years in the role. Fortunately, she is not lost to the movement, taking up the role as Administration Manager at Noosa Heads SLSC. Subsequent to season-end, Merrill Schwab has been appointed as Branch Administrator and although somewhat daunted by the "big shoes to fill" is off to a good start and settling in well prior to the 2021/22 season. To Tanya and Bronwyn, Aaron and the Regional SLSQ team - thank you for your ongoing loyalty and commitment within your roles and for the support you have provided me and the Branch Executive over the last year.

I also want to thank Tim Ryan, who agreed to put his name forward for the Deputy President role during the season. This allowed John Thorpe, after 15 years as either President or Deputy President to step back. John does, however, continue to provide counsel to myself and the Executive as Life Member on Committee. Both Tim and I share great pride that the Sunshine Coast Branch, its members and Clubs are held in the highest regard by our communities and our peers. I congratulate you all on the legacy you have created and the many great things you will achieve in the future.

Branch Director Reports

Well, another year has come to an end. We have battled the ongoing impacts of the COVID recovery era. There were further impacts throughout the season, often with requirements for club services to change with very short

notice. Thank you to all the wonderful Club Captains that made this happen without incident. We look forward to the ongoing recovery and normalisation of life post COVID.

Unfortunately, the 20/21 season saw an increase in the number of drownings in our region with eight drownings on Sunshine Coast beaches. Of note was the Stumers Creek drowning, that was a huge effort from many volunteers across three days with a sad outcome of locating the young man's body on day three. This drowning had a larger than usual impact on our team, we thank everyone who was involved in this effort and other major events across the season. It is unclear why there was an increase in drownings this season, although a detailed analysis of the state-wide data is underway. On a more positive note, there was an impressive 276 rescues conducted by our wonderful lifesavers during the season. That is 276 drownings prevented, well done. There were 97 medical emergencies lifesavers dealt with requiring ambulance. Further, we saw 51 external 13SURF requests for urgent assistance from Police and Ambulance, to which our clubs responded.

There were some important projects conducted throughout the year, the major one being finalising our RWC trial which was run at two Sunshine Coast clubs. This project was making history by requesting approval for them to be formalised into a permanent arrangement with patrol service agreements in place of our traditional IRBs at specific suitable locations.

Our Branch lifesaving team is made up of four District Supervisors and Lifesaving Officers. These individuals give considerable time in their roles undertaking various tasks to support quality assurance, education, and operations, thank you. A particular thank you to Geoff Jeffcoat who undertook the role of Deputy Director of Lifesaving, Geoff spent countless hours attending meetings helping where I wasn't available.

I have worked closely with most Club Captains over the season, thank you for being understanding and for the hard work you put in keeping lifesavers on your beaches. Our regional and Branch staff do an exceptional job at making the world go around and all put in well above and beyond what is expected, answering calls and emails at all hours. I work particularly closely with Aaron Purchase and Riley Mitchell, thank you for your efforts and support.

Unfortunately, Riley tendered his resignation late in the season, and he will be sadly missed. This season also saw the loss of our long-term administration manager Tanya Duncan, Tan has kept this branch in fine form for nearly two decades. Tan will be missed, and we look forward to working Merrill Schwab who has now commenced in the role.

The end of 20/21 season will see significant change on the Branch executive with myself, Santo and Narelle moving on after finishing our terms. Thank you to everyone who has supported me over the past two years. I will remain in the background to help the incoming director of lifesaving. Gerard – thank you for your support and we look forward to you sitting another term as the Branch President.

This Branch has a long history of being arguably the best Branch in the state. When I attend state meetings or events, it is obvious we stand well above other branches in regard to service delivery, compliance and quality

assurance. This is something we should be very proud of. Thank you to all our wonderful lifesavers and volunteers across the coast for your efforts.

The 2020-2021 season has been an interesting exercise in patience as lifesaving and the community worked through the stop-start landscape of COVID restrictions. Despite this, all membership programs were successfully run by the Branch team, and attendance was high as club members took every opportunity to join with their fellow lifesavers.

Sunshine Coast Branch did have a slight (2%) decrease in membership numbers from last season. The most significant impact was to Junior participation levels, as a number of clubs put in place intake caps to avoid 'burn out' of their Junior Activities workforce as they dealt with the added responsibilities and duties to implement COVID measures.

The extract below from SLSQ's Membership Statistics indicates that despite the challenges of COVID Sunshine Coast Branch experienced only a slight reduction in its total membership numbers, and maintained good retention results in its active membership. Great work by Sunny Coast Clubs to remain in touch with their members and encourage them to stay involved despite long periods of isolation and restriction. I have heard of many examples of Clubs initiating regular social gatherings and activities, aimed solely at getting their members together.

The season kicked-off in August at the Junior Activities Forum held at Maroochydore SLSC. Though social distancing was in place and clubs had only recently re-opened, surf club representation was high. Keen discussions abounded on how Fields of Play operated and Clubs raised concerns on the expected financial impact of reduced membership. Now 12 months later, it has been really pleasing to see how successfully Clubs operated throughout very uncertain times and how members willingly returned to support their Clubs.

As 2021 progressed many Clubs spoke of the positive impact of 'Fields of Play' on the day-to-day running of junior events. It is noted that there was increased engagement by parents who want to be part of the JA programs. Perhaps this is a reflection that the lifesaving community has been able to provide social and sporting activities to its members, something that other sporting and community clubs could not provide because of COVID restrictions.

The week after Easter 2021, Branch hosted the 2nd Lifesaving Development Program run in Queensland. Originally run by Sunshine Coast Branch, the Program is now funded by SLSQ and was a joint venture between Sunshine Coast and SLSQ. Leaders and participants from North Queensland, Wide-Bay, Sunshine Coast and the Gold Coast met for 7 days of action-packed learning and experience. Training was based at the Sunshine Coast Recreation Centre and IRB activities were held at Kings Beach. Like many lifesaving activities it is the contributions of many people that make it a success. Thank you to the coordination team - Riley Palmer, Courtney Taylor, Dave Scullion, Zoe Breitkreutz, Kylie Keegan – and all others who gave their time, commitment and friendship to make the camp a success. I would also like to acknowledge Metropolitan Caloundra SLSC for their generosity in allowing us to use their Club facilities for IRB and classroom training sessions. The crew at Met-Cal were so helpful and friendly, we couldn't have asked for more.

Pushing on through the year, Branch started to organise PULSE; the only membership development program aimed at 18+ members. The PULSE format was changed to day training to ensure it could run even if the State was placed under restriction. Though not the usual live-in camp, PULSE 2021 was no less successful than previous years. The Co-ordination team made-up of Eliza Dreves, Dave Scullion, Riley Palmer, Sam Smith and Tara Emery put together a great weekend of information and training, culminating in a multi-incident scenario to test participants in the field. Participant feedback was again very positive, and Branch received a number of requests to hold PULSE twice a season so more people can attend.

2021 started with Camp Commando, our 13-15 years lifesaving camp. Lead by Aleeshia Chick and her co-ordination team, over 140 young lifesavers spent 4 days at the Maleny Recreation Camp. Camp Commando is the foundation stone of Branch membership programs and through its team building and self-awareness activities, builds our youth up to achieve future success in lifesaving and personal goals.

Finally, the season ended with 200 glamorous youth dancing the night away at the Youth Ball, held at Maroochydore SLSC. The Planning team comprising Tara Emery, Sam Smith, Eliza Dreves and Ruben Zirkarsky put together a great night and launched an exciting initiative 'The Club Spirit Award'. Sunshine Coast Clubs were given the challenge to produce a 1 minute video that illustrated club pride, creativity and all-round spirit. The winner was judged by the participants and Branch awarded a \$300 prize to the winning Club to go towards organising their youth events. Lots of fun and energetic submissions were made, with the final result being taken out by Marcoola SLSC.

The Youth Ball had a hidden bonus as the chaperones mingled and shared ideas on junior lifesaving activities. New connections were made, and I suspect in the next season there will be a number of activities organised between clubs aimed to foster friendships and strengthen club ties.

Defence Force Recruitment have again been the major sponsor and supporter of Sunshine Coast Branch's member development initiatives, and I would like to thank Captain Tim Glen and the Maroochydore DFR team for their time and contributions this season.

The success of the Sunshine Coast Branch's membership activities is largely because a group of like-minded people work together for that common goal – building our member's capability. So many people have contributed, but I would especially like to thank both Deputy Directors, Tara Emery (Youth) and Rob Campbell (Junior Activities) for the time and effort they have put into ensuring that representation of their areas continues.

Like any job there is a lot of admin work done behind the scenes and my role would be much more difficult without the help of Sunshine Coast's SLSQ staff. Thank you, Aleeshia Chick for your constant smile, laughter and guidance offered to me over the last 18 months. To Ethan Schomberg and Timica Hawkins who recently commenced as Sunshine Coast Branch's Membership & Education team - you exude Yin and Yang, and together make a complete team. Thank you for all your help over the last few months, and I wish you well for your roles in supporting Branch activities.

I would like to thank President Gerard O'Brien and my fellow Board members and the Branch Administration team comprising Merrill Schwab and Bronwyn Gilchrist, who have been of enormous assistance throughout the season.

This is my second year as Director of Youth & Membership and will be my final year. I will be handing this role over to Kirsten Philips for the next season. I wish Kirsten and the incoming Youth and Membership Committee the very best of luck for 2021-22. I have really enjoyed representing Membership across the Sunshine Coast Branch and have been rewarded by meeting some great youth, passionate lifesavers and inspiring committee members.

When Sunshine Coast Branch hosted all Sunshine Coast Branch clubs at Maroochydore Surf Life Saving Club for the annual Junior Activities Forum in 2020, we were just emerging from the shadows of several months of Covid lockdown. We were dealing with a new norm of social distancing, face masks, hand sanitization, and great uncertainty. Almost all junior winter sport had been cancelled, however with community transmissions under control and increasing freedoms afforded to the community, the green shoots of optimism started to appear.

As the 2020 JA Forum unfolded and presentations were made by SLSQ staff who had been dealing directly with the Queensland Government, new terminologies were abounding, Covid Safe Plans, Field of Play, Sanitisation Stations, control points, contact tracing, it was apparent that this was not going to be a normal season and it was going to take exceptional people to manage exceptional circumstances. It became immediately apparent to several of our larger clubs that they would have to cap numbers to manage their field of play requirements.

Sunshine Coast Branch had seen 5 years consecutive growth in our Junior Activities and Associates membership, however it has taken a pandemic to drive our first reduction in numbers in 6 years.

The overall retention rate of 61% for our Juniors was 1% lower than the previous season.

Whilst our overall numbers were down, many clubs held the line and some made gains in membership. A special mention to Redcliffe Surf Life Saving Club for their monumental increase in Juniors from 179 to 331 in a season, that's an incredible 85% increase.

Our clubs have collectively produced a total of 198 Under 14's this season. Congratulations to each and every one of them for attaining their SRC award, a great achievement and the essence of why we conduct Junior Activities.

We thank all clubs who hosted carnivals this season together with all of the carnival support personnel – Administration, Officials, Water Safety and Gear Stewards. Congratulations to the many fine performances and sportsmanship of our Juniors at this year's State Titles, there is a lot to look forward to in the future.

A huge thank you to our Branch staff, coordination team, mentors, leaders, facilitators and logistics personnel for the delivery of yet another highly successful Camp Commando Branch Development program. This program continues to set the standard for our U14 and U15's with 130 participants attending this year's program.

Congratulations and good luck to all of those members and clubs who have gone above and beyond this season and who will vie for our prestigious Awards of Excellence, and particularly those vying for the U14 Junior Life Saver of the Year and the Andy Frizzell services to Junior Activities.

Despite all the potential problems that were in front of them every Sunday morning was extremely well run and managed by Shaun and his enthusiastic Committee and with the support and commitment of the Peregian Nipper organisers, the Peregian Nippers also enjoyed another very good season. With that said, without the wonderful turnout of lifesavers, supporting bus drivers and smoothie makers, 45 seahorse Nipper kids would miss out and be bitterly disappointed, so a sincere thank you to all concerned. Patron Dawn Fraser was on hand at the final morning to congratulate all the participants and present Certificates, trophies with a little lifesaver toy.

The Supporters Club has rebounded extremely strongly since the Queensland border was reopened with only Australians travelling internally to see their country. I acknowledge the work and efforts of Manager Anton Mogg and his team of dedicated people who have ensured that the Supporters Club has continued to operate incredibly well since its closure for three months from March 24th to June 26th last year. With leadership from the Supporters Club Board, chaired by Life Governor Ian Young, new budgets were implemented, due to the three month closure and then the subsequent limited operations due to some easing of the COVID restrictions. The Board worked

extremely closely with the Surf Club Board to ensure that they both operated in sync with both income and expenditure forecasts. This came about due to the great collaboration and frequent communication between the Supporters Club Finance Officer Wally Schaller and Club Director of Finance Rob Harney.

Both the Supporters Club and Surf Club Boards have completed their Strategic Plans, and these will be presented to the upcoming AGM for the members' endorsement. It is this planning that ensures that the future sustainability, market share, funding, staffing and communication at all levels are maintained to ensure security and success of the Club for up to the next ten years. The Board members were able to openly discuss ideas and goals plus look further ahead to the more distant future and the sustainability of the Club. I take this opportunity to acknowledge the confidence and commitment displayed by all in attendance that will most definitely better prepare the Club for the vears ahead.

The Sponsorship Committee continued to achieve further growth across all departments and held two extremely successful Sponsors Breakfasts to showcase our lifesaving, youth, athletes, and commitment to the community. A highlight and special achievement has undoubtedly been that no Sponsors have been lost due to COVID during the past 12 months. It is also very important that members are very aware of the support the Sponsors provide to the Club and support them wherever it is possible to do so.

I remind members of the outstanding effort of Club Ambassador Kareena Lee, to qualify for the Australian Olympic Swimming Team to compete at the Tokyo Olympics in the 10km Ocean Race. Kareena qualified in 2019 but due to COVID, the Olympics were postponed until July this year. She was not required to requalify but has maintained her high training schedule, mainly in Noosa. At the time of writing the Club is planning to hold an 'Off to Tokyo' function for her in June. Three times Australian Open Men's Surf Race Champion Nick Sloman hopes to also qualify for the Olympics in the 10km Ocean Swim and/or the pool 1500m events. These qualifying swims will take place in Portugal on the 19th June. We wish him all the best and hope he will be at the 'Off to Tokyo' function as an Olympian.

The tremendous support I received from all Board members and particularly the additional effort by former Deputy President Rob Harney, to remain as Director of Finance until this year's budget is endorsed, is sincerely acknowledged. Director of Administration Barry Leek continued to work tirelessly ensuring that all efforts were made to support our Clubs administration and Club Council meetings as per constitutional requirements as well as being our leading Carnival Official. Thanks Barry!

The Annual Dinner was held on Friday 21st May and was an absolute sell-out and great success. The organising committee of Tanya, Renee, Sheridan, Anna, Justine, and Jan can be extremely proud of their results which came from careful and intricate planning and execution of those plans. To walk into the Supporters Club was like walking into a totally different venue with the tables and decorations looking magnificent. Thanks must also go Moggy and his team for their assistance in setting up and work done during the night. The food was 6 star, and all 280 guests agreed it was an impressive night and got into the spirit of the Gatsby theme. Surprise guest on the night,

Ambassador and Legend Anthony Carroll [Harries] from Bondi Rescue, was a great hit and really warmed to the occasion. A fantastic evening and thanks to all involved.

In closing, I also acknowledge the support received from our governing bodies being both Surf Life Saving Queensland and Sunshine Coast Branch. Our relationship continues to be a very strong and stable, one built over many years of trust and communication between us all. The newly elected Noosa Shire Council under Mayor Clare Stewart, now communicates openly and support any activities we have at Noosa Beach, and we thank them.

Huge congratulations to our medallists, Grace Otto, Abbie Tolano, Gemma Welch-Smith & Claire Derrington for your team and individual achievements at Aussies 2021 – Maroochydore Beach.

Our small, but highly competitive cohort of competitors continues to punch above its weight, and the medals won at the Aussies will remind all our junior members that we can achieve success on the national platform through commitment and hard work.

Alongside Josh, we want to acknowledge the great work of coaches Pauline Gleeson, Paul Gilmour, Zion Pettigrove, Alice Jones, Lachie Lansdown, Craig Law, and Lisa Worthington for your time and commitment in inspiring and supporting our surf competitors to achieve great things. Social gatherings for Active members have also made a comeback post-Covid, with members enjoying a variety of events, from 'Sunday Social' casual gatherings to larger functions. Particular thanks go to Ross Williams as the new Director of Senior Activities and Cal Stephens for her work organising the January summer party, "Cocktails & Dreams", which was a huge success, with members dancing the night away in the Ocean View Room. More recently, the "end of season BBQ" gathering on the club lawn also enjoyed record numbers in attendance to celebrate the season.

We are so lucky to be here enjoying Sunshine Beach and contributing to our amazing community. Thank you to everyone within our wonderful club.

We are looking forward to another year together in which we can grow and support our Active Members between the flags, our Nipper Program, Surf Sports, and continue to build the success of the new Clubhouse. We are proud to be 'one club', with a common purpose of keeping our community safe and supporting our community to come together across all aspects of our club.

It only seemed liked yesterday that we closed the beaches at the end of season 19-20 and nervously looked ahead to what the next season would look like in the new COVID world.

The good news is that, despite the COVID challenges, the club has had a great season in our 102nd year of keeping Coolum Beach safe. The club is now pretty much fully open again, albeit still making sure we comply with the COVID protocols, and our members have been able to get back to normal club life again. Upstairs, our Supporters club have weathered the COVID restrictions and are getting back to as close as they can to full trading while still managing to the Qld Health requirements.

On the beach, where it all matters, the club has had it all. The season was book-ended by two tragic drownings. The first was in rough seas in late 2020 when a young Toowoomba mother lost her life in First Bay and then, recently our members were involved in the search for a 21-year-old man who lost his life just south of Stumers Creek. As always, the response by our members was first class and has been highly praised by SLSQ, QPS and the families. During the peak Christmas – New Year period our patrolling members had to deal with tough conditions and were able to keep the beach open most days to allow locals and tourist alike to enjoy the beach as best they can. During the season our members have been called on to complete 25 rescues and 945 preventative actions, as well as responding well to the Buhk Wilkes inspections.

As I have said many times there is a lot of moving parts in making sure our members can do what they do and this year was no different. Our trainers and assessors did an amazing job getting everyone through the Skills Assessments, training our new Bronze and SRC members and upgrading our members awards. The new training space was put to good use and has been well received. All of our officers worked diligently to make sure the vehicles and IRBs were working, the patrol gear was in good shape, we had the first aid equipment we need, our radios were in good order and our facilities were looked after.

From a Surf Sports perspective our small, but dedicated teams did the club proud with great results at all levels from Nippers through to the evergreen Basil, Ken and Di in the 70 plus category. Our board riding team led by Bruce and Patty, were crowned the top club in Queensland.

Special mention to our Surf Woman of the Year, Jess Appel, who hit the ground running and never stopped. In particular the inaugural Bay to Beach swim and Eco Surf Fair were very well received and look like being part of the Coolum calendar going forward. In May, I was very proud to be there when Jess won the Runner-up Award and the Most Funds Raised Award at the Gala dinner. Great results for Jess, she did herself and the club proud.



The Foundation currently has funds of \$374,882. It is my goal to see this grow to \$500,000 over the next two years.

Building Committee: The Building Committee consisting of Jim Chisholm (Chairperson), Ron Youels, John Brannock, Denis Croft, Brian Wooldridge, and Neil Hallagan. I am very grateful to Neil Hallagan who joined the Building Committee as the Club's Asset Maintenance Coordinator and has looked after all the various maintenance projects carried out at the Clubhouse during the year.

Our Achievements

Offsite Storage: We finally received Council approval to build the offsite storage shed with the money received from Gambling Community Grant in 2019. The earthworks and concrete slab were completed on 14 May 2021 with the shed construction due for completion in June.

Property Management: The Clubhouse sub-lease agreement with the Supporters' Club has finally received Council consent for registration after a two-year wait. Unfortunately, there is still no formal license agreement with the

Council for the use of the Boatshed and we are continuing our efforts with the Council to formalise this arrangement.

During the year we have continued to implement our Clubhouse Asset Management Plan with the replacement of the Clubhouse roof, installation of solar panels, building a separate volunteer lifesavers' office, upgrading Clubhouse security and other necessary maintenance needs.

Lifesaving Equipment: The season commenced with the commissioning of our new patrol trailer. Our thanks must go to Steve Maitland who committed many hours of his time in delivering this valuable piece of lifesaving equipment. During the year we have purchased a range of essential lifesaving equipment, as well as much need nipper boards and equipment.

A highlight of the season was the christening of our new surf boat which was named the "Ron Dittmann" and called "the Ditty" for short. This was achieved through the efforts of "Molly" (Jase Bean) and our "Boaties" in fundraising, securing sponsors, and the sale of the old boat. Their efforts made it financially possible for the Club to commit the additional funds for the building of the new surf boat.

Our Future

We are extremely lucky in having the financial experience and knowledge of Graham Archdall (Life Member) as Treasurer. The Club is in a strong position thanks to the time and effort he contributes guiding the Board through all the various financial decision we make.

It is our expectation that the 2021/2022 season will commence as normal with social distancing and increased personal safety measures being the "new norm" in all parts of our life. The Annual General Meeting will be held on Saturday 26 June 2021 at 10:00am. This will allow all the pre-season activities to be carried out well before the start of the season in September.

This year, a major focus for the Board will be the securing of funds to redevelop the Kings Beach Surf Life Saving Facility (alias "The Boathouse"). It is becoming virtually impossible to operate out of this facility with the increased equipment necessary for lifesaving activities, the growth of our nippers and its poor state of repair.

I would like to thank everyone who has helped and supported me during the year and more so to all those members who make it very special in just being part of Metropolitan-Caloundra Surf Lifesaving Club.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2021

Mode 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland), the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements , AASB 108: Accounting Policies , Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significent accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

The associations has received an exemption from income tax in accordance with Section 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Lessehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Legsehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the legse or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset Depreciation Rate **Buildings and Ramp** Plant and Equipment 20% - 40% Motor Vehicles 25%

(c) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(d) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(h) Leases

Concessionary Leases

For leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the Association to further its objectives. (commonly known as peppercom/concessionary leases), the Association has adopted the temporary relief under AASB 2018-8 and measures the right of use assets at cost on initial recognition.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Financial Assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the Association commits itself to either the purchase or the sale of the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where evallable, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain a significant financing component or if the practical expedient was applied as specified in AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers.

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Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising

Coerating grants and donations

When the association receives operating grant revenue or donations, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the Association:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant;
- recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement; and
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the Association:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable Accounting Standards (for example, AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138);
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the association recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Capital grants

When the association receives a capital grant, it recognises a liability for the excess of the initial carrying amount of the financial asset received over any related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer) recognised under other Australian Accounting Standards.

The association recognises income in profit or loss when or as the association satisfies its obligations under the terms of the

Interest income

interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Income from sale of goods or services
