Sustainable for the future: To ensure our future through continuous growth, strong financial management and sound governance.

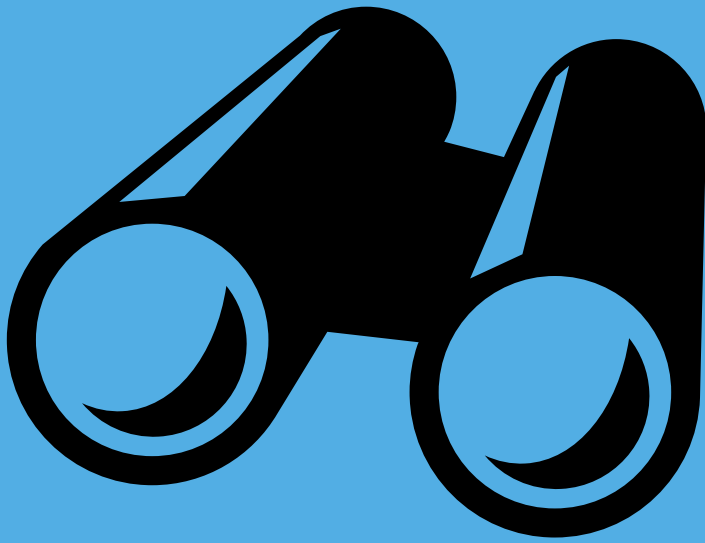

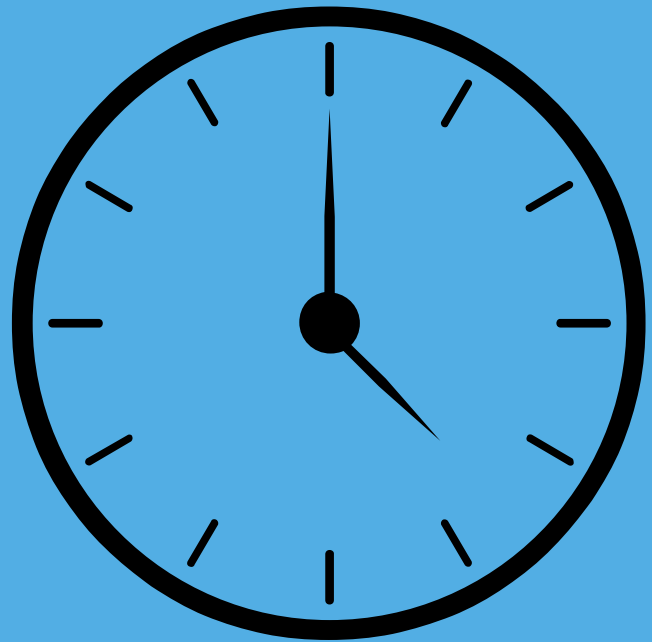

BRANCH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 2021/22 Surf Lifesaving season was a year of rebuilding for Sunshine Coast Branch Clubs after the COVID-induced turmoil of the previous years. Despite the looming vaccination mandate towards the end of the season, all Clubs provided first class service to the communities they support and generally grew membership numbers across the board. The eventual deferment of the mandate lifted the pressure on Clubs and the full scope of traditional services and member activities was restored. Hopefully, it will remain that way going forward. As a result, we are able to return to the normal annual recognition of season achievements at Club, Branch, State and National level. I wish to extend my deepest congratulations to all those from our Branch whose achievements have been recognised with a Branch Award or a nomination as you will see in this report. I, and your colleagues, rightfully celebrate your success.

The goal of Surf Lifesaving Sunshine Coast is to save lives and to protect our local community and visitors to our region particularly between the 'red and yellow flags'. During 2021/22, there were, once again, no lives lost between the flags. However, tragically, there were 4 drownings on our beaches (along with 1 additional fatality as a result of a medical issue) reminding us of the need to be ever vigilant and always strive to improve our performance as individual lifesavers, Clubs and wider organisation. As always, deeper analysis of these tragedies will inform decisions on resources and equipment to enable even more timely and efficient responses in future.

Our communities entrust us with great responsibility and respect. This trust requires us to monitor and review our operations, to recruit and retain the best people, to support and develop those members' skills and knowledge and to continuously grow as a strong and sustainable organisation. We must not be afraid to innovate in the pursuit of even better outcomes across every aspect of the movement. This is a theme that the Sunshine Coast Branch at many levels has been advocating for on behalf of both members and Clubs and we will continue to do so. I am pleased to advise that trials of drone technology to complement lifesaving services will commence in full swing at a number of Sunshine Coast Branch Clubs over the season ahead. It is clear that this technology must form a critical part of our volunteer services moving forward. Similarly, through our advocacy, Clubs are now able to apply for permission to employ Jetski's (RWC's) as an alternative to IRB's where beach/Club conditions dictate this is a more effective rescue craft.

Every weekend and public holiday from September to May our active volunteers perform an incredible number of hours, in addition to the many extra hours given by our Operations Support Services; RWC, Duty Officers, Surfcom and After-Hours callout crews. Similarly, the safe beaches we enjoy are only possible due to the network behind the scenes; our trainers and assessors who spend countless hours training, assessing, developing and mentoring our members. The awards and skills gained don't just count between the red and yellow flags; they also make a difference in the community, giving our members life-long skills to help others in need. Our local Councils, from Moreton Bay in the south, through Sunshine Coast and Noosa and to Gympie in the north, rely heavily on the volunteer services that our, now 15, Clubs provide. The relationships we enjoy at both Club and Branch level with these local authorities is outstanding and underpins our success. Thanks again to each of the Mayors for their endorsement as joint Patrons of our Branch.

I am pleased to report that during 2021/22, the Peregian Beach SLSC has been re-established and will take up independent operations from the start of the 2022/23 season. It is important to recognise the

incredible contribution made by the Noosa Heads SLSC to maintain volunteer lifesaving services at Peregrin Beach over the past 8 seasons since the former Club collapsed. This has been an extraordinary effort by this Club and its members, one which few Clubs would be prepared to tackle. New committees are already in place at Peregrin Beach and community support is strong. Full SLS affiliation will be granted for the 2022/23 season. While the challenges for the fledgling Club are significant, there is now a good degree of confidence the Club can succeed. I should also pay tribute to John Roderick, former President of Coolumb Beach SLSC, who has agreed to guide the development of the new Club through its initial 2 years.

While Peregrin Beach SLSC enters its first year of operation, the Mooloolaba SLSC will celebrate its centenary in 2022/23. Congratulations to this Club on the milestone and best wishes for the many events scheduled over the season ahead.

Surf Sports competition returned to normal again with a full schedule of Branch events completed in 2021/22. Our competitors, as usual, performed at a very high level and in good spirit. The Sunshine Coast Branch Championships were keenly contested again with a strong turnout. Well done to all who took part and to the Alexandra Headland Club for winning the Champion Club title. The Sunshine Coast Branch Titles are perhaps the only such titles that have continuously been run for well over 20 years uninterrupted and remain well supported. Many thanks, of course, to our officials, team managers and water safety crews. Long hours are put in to showcase our great athletes and to provide the Sunshine Coast community with high quality events. Unfortunately, Mother Nature intervened and the State Titles, scheduled across the three neighboring Clubs of Alexandra Headland, Maroochydore and Mooloolaba, had to be cancelled. The ensuing Australian Titles, hosted on the Gold Coast, were also interrupted by bad weather/conditions but Sunshine Coast Clubs and individuals enjoyed spectacular success. I am also pleased to report that the Sunshine Coast representative team returned to "the winners circle" at the Interbranch championship to make it 13 out of the last 14 titles! The team's performance was outstanding across the board and every single competitor, team manager and coach should be proud of this great legacy and record. Our Branch will continue to seek to innovate in carnival formats and events to lead the movement forward. An example of this is the adoption of the "Live Heats" carnival management system nationally, which was first introduced to the movement and trialed by the Sunshine Coast Branch.

The membership development initiatives on the Sunshine Coast remain the benchmark for the movement. Camp Commando, PULSE Advanced Lifesaving Program and the Lifesaving Development Program offer great opportunities for Clubs within the Branch to develop young leaders in our Clubs and the local community. I was privileged to, once again, present the Awards at the end of Camp Commando this year and was astounded by the teamwork and support that this very large cohort of our young members displayed. These development programs identify amazing capabilities in our members and the Branch remains proud of this ongoing commitment to our members to deliver these programs annually. The benefits of developing our youth are also recognised by outside organisations, such as Defence Force Recruiting, who continue to support these programs annually.

A new supporter of our lifesaving development initiatives emerged in 2021/22. In response to the tragic loss of Callum Maggs at just 28 years of age on 25 April 2021 at Kawana, his colleagues at Perform360, a Brisbane-based gym, supported by the Maggs family, initiated a fund-raising program to seek to prevent

similar incidents on Sunshine Coast beaches. This program proved to be an outstanding success and the funds raised have been dedicated to both our lifesaving development programs as well as to support the rollout of drones as a critical new lifesaving technology. Perform360 are keen to extend their fundraising program and support of these important aspects of our work over the years ahead. It a fitting tribute to Callum's too short life that, out of tragedy, comes a major contribution to ensuring other lives are saved.

Our Directors, Officers and Boards work hard to maintain high standards and to build their teams for the future, all to ensure best practise operations across all the portfolios. The Branch Council and Executive share the view that the broader surf lifesaving movement needs to be more open to new ways of doing things, embracing new technology and adapting to different attitudes and lifestyles of younger generations. I am hopeful that we will see further initiatives and improvements in the coming season. The Branch is also advocating for increased emphasis on "volunteerism" within our movement with particular focus on reducing complexity (and paperwork!) for our volunteers.

Our Branch Council (all 15 Club Presidents) holds years of experience, both within lifesaving and from the professional world and every councillor has contributed strongly. I extend my thanks to each of you for your support over the year. I am confident that you will continue to achieve great things within your own Club and also collaboratively with the Branch for years to come.

To the Branch Executive; Tim, Peter, Simon, Kirsten, Santo and John - thank you for your commitment and dedication to your roles and the support you have provided. Next season will see a significant change with the retirement of Santo Della Bianca (Director Surf Sports) after 14 years in the role. These will be "big shoes to fill."

This region is very fortunate to have a diverse and professional team of both Branch and SLSQ staff. The Regional team, capably led by Aaron Purchase, are committed to providing a high level of support to our Branch and Club Officers as well as seeking to work within the guidelines of SLSQ and SLISA. This season also marked the first full season for Merrill Schwab as Branch Administrator. Merrill has now grown into this challenging role and has been well supported by Bronwyn Gilchrist, who will mark 20 years working for the Branch in September 2022. To Merrill and Bronwyn, Aaron and the Regional SLSQ team - thank you for your ongoing loyalty and commitment within your roles and for the support you have provided me and the Branch Executive over the last year.

I want to thank Tim Ryan for his support as Deputy President throughout the season. Both Tim and I share great pride that the Sunshine Coast Branch, its members and Clubs are held in the highest regard by our communities and our peers. I congratulate you all on the legacy you have created and the many great things you will achieve in the future.

DIRECTOR OF LIFESAVING REPORT

The ongoing effects of COVID in our Clubs and patrols were felt during the season, and Clubs performed excellently during a difficult year. My thanks to all Club Captains who again performed one of the tougher roles at a Club admirably.

This year, patrolling members of our now 15 Clubs performed an astonishing 281 rescues, and conducted 2,933 first aid activities. The season unfortunately saw four drownings and an additional fatality due to medical issues, but again no lives were lost between the flags on our beautiful Sunshine Coast Beaches. Further, we saw 62 external 13SURF requests for urgent assistance from Police and Ambulance, to which our clubs responded.

To enhance patrols and utilise technology, recent trials of rescue water craft (RWC) at Sunshine Beach and Peregrine have been deemed so successful that permanent arrangements for clubs to utilise these craft across the state should they wish to are now being implemented. In the new season, trials of drones which have been utilised by our Operations Support members will be expanded to trial their integration with club patrols.

Our Branch lifesaving team is made up of a three District Supervisors and lifesaving officers. These individuals give considerable time in their roles undertaking various tasks to support quality assurance, education, and operations, and we thank you. Thank you to Doug Gould, Sam Fiorin and a particular thank you to David Scullion who undertook the role of Deputy Director of Lifesaving as well as District Supervisor, spending countless hours conducting patrol inspections and we also thank all Patrol Captains for their positive attitudes. Our congratulations to the Buhk Wilkes Club of the Year, Marcoola SLSC for their dedication to excellence.

The education team awarded nearly 150 of our members with the Silver Medallion in Beach Management, and 3 Gold Medallion awards were also conferred. Thanks to the wonderful donation received from Perform 360, the education team have been able to purchase a bleeding control kit for use by all our Sunshine Coast Clubs to assist in training their members in emergency response to incidents involving bleeding.

Following the floods in February, a large number of our dedicated members put their hands up for the Emergency Response duties being on standby to assist our coastal communities as required. We saw members from a number of clubs involved in flood water relief work in the Noosa area and deployed to Brisbane which experienced more severe impacts than we did on the coast. This is a testament to the commitment of our members to support our community during times of need.

DIRECTOR OF YOUTH & MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Despite the craziness of COVID again this season, Branch-wide membership was up 8% and junior activities membership was up 10%, unfortunately our active membership was down slightly by 3% so still some work to be done. The Sunshine Coast Branch also delivered a fantastic program of youth and membership development activities.

The season kicked-off with our start of season junior activities and youth development forums held online. Our junior activities programs have been kicking goals right across the coast and our JACs are commended on the high standards they deliver. Thanks to my Deputy Director for Junior Activities Rob Campbell for his leadership in junior activities across the Branch this season and for his support in guiding Clubs in relation to developing their programs. Likewise, our youth development officers brought a high level of enthusiasm and willingness to grow the youth membership base.

PULSE was our first development program of the year held in November and remains the only program that caters to members over 18 with no upper age limit. It is focused on developing our frontline lifesavers to ensure they are confident in managing emergency responses on patrol. This year saw us further refine the program to include the delivery of a team goal setting practical exercise which was exceptionally well done by all participants and continues to be used by a number of patrols. Well done to the coordination team and all the contributors to the program this season! The Branch is looking to further build on this program this coming season adopting a new PULSE Junior program building on the success of the Alexandra Headland SLSC program this year.

Unfortunately, due to COVID, Camp Commando was postponed from our usual January timeslot to become a winter program in July. This year we celebrated 10 years since the program was re-worked and re-branded to the Camp Commando name. This re-branding also aligned 10 years ago with the partnership which was established with Defence Force Recruiting – a partnership that has endured the full 10 years. We thank DFR for both their funding support and their support in delivering exceptional development activities as part of the Camp Commando program. Thanks also to Rotary Sunshine Coast for their kind donation towards the program.

I was proud of our team this year and I'm confident our branch has the competitors and expertise to regain this trophy again in 2022.

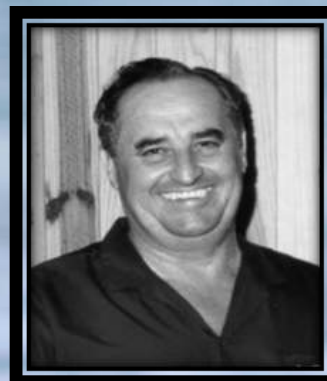

Lifesaving is our core business and for the 94th year the proud record of no lives lost between the flags at both Noosa Main Beach and Peregrin Beaches, remained intact and I congratulate the members who have contributed to maintaining this critical and outstanding record. This great result and achievement, commends our PCs and patrolling members who contribute to our 21 patrol teams. Club Captain Roger Aspinall has again praised their efforts on many occasions and also reflected on the wonderful training provided by all our trainers across all areas of skills and awards controlled by CTO Paul Jenkinson. Over and above patrolling commitments, a number of our lifesavers also volunteer for SLSQ Waverunner duties and some of these members also form part of the Clubs' Emergency Response Group [ERG] who are available 24/7 to be called out for various emergencies by the Police. Unfortunately, on occasions it is necessary to support recovery operations of deceased people from the ocean, beach, or rocks. I acknowledge their very valuable support and dedication of these members in these difficult situations.

I commend member Jessie Lloyd-Stewart for her prompt action off the National Park on 7th February 2022, and that due to my presence in the surfing group, left me in no doubt that her immediate actions saved a life and thus ensuring it was a rescue instead of a recovery.

The Masters Board Riding Team was training at an early morning surfing session when Jessie fortuitously spotted the man who was of a solid build, clothed and wearing shoes, in trouble among the rocks and being washed under by the surf rolling in. It took around one hour from Jessie reaching him to finally arrive at the ambulance after being carried up by stretcher. It was a very difficult situation to conduct a rescue with sets of waves rolling past along the rocks as he was passing in and out of consciousness. We are all very proud of Jessie for her vitally important urgent response and subsequent lifesaving actions. Congratulations.

Jessie has subsequently been awarded with a Rescue Medal by SLSA for the Rescue of the Month of February and will be presented with her award in the near future.

A personal highlight for the 2022 year was the honour of inducting two new Life Members at the Annual Dinner on 13th May. Gina Lynch and Felicity O'Brien have served the Club for over 20 years and contributed to the Club in many quite different fields, yet very similar in some others. They both joined Nippers as mothers of four children and watched them grow and transition through all the age groups to the senior club, whilst supporting them as Age Managers or assistants, water safety officers, trainers or in other roles. After they both gained their Bronze Medallions, they patrolled for 20 years and continue to do so today. Their husbands and partners also patrol and compete for the Club in Masters Competition and Felicity with her husband Gerard, became the first husband and wife members in the Clubs history, to both achieve Life Membership of Noosa.

To present two deserving and valuable patrolling members with a Presidents Medal, was another highlight for myself at the Annual Dinner. The contributions by Jack Lewis during the year were varied, yet significant, and included being an Age Manager for JAC for the 3rd year running, was the Board Riding [Surfing] Captain, arranged visits to Noosa by Indigenous kids from Cherbourg after travelling to Cherbourg to conduct water safety sessions, volunteering to be part of the Working Group for the Clubs Sheds and as a Professional Town Planner and Businessman, donating his considerable expertise and time for required Noosa Council planning requirements.

19 year old, Jessie Lloyd-Stewart, trained and competed in First Aid and Champion Lifesaver Competitions through to the Australian Championships, competed in the Board riding Team, became a qualified Lifeguard, attended to Camp Commando as a leader, and last but not least, performed a vital rescue off National Park that resulted in a successful rescue, instead of a recovery. For her fantastic effort Jessie was honoured with the SLSA Rescue Medal. Congratulations to both Jack and Jessie.

I remind members of the outstanding effort of Club swim competitor and Ambassador Kareena Lee, who won an Olympic Bronze Medal in the 10km Marathon Swim with the Australian swimming Team at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics, but eventually held in 2021 after being postponed due to the COVID pandemic. Kareena actually qualified in 2019 but had to wait until July 2021. Prior to her departure, the Club held a send-off for her in the Supporters Club with many guests including mentor Dawn Fraser and Kareena's Coach John Rogers. Kareena's swim at Tokyo was nothing short of amazing and after swimming an incredible 10km in just a squeak under 2 hours, she was just a second from Gold and a touch from Silver. Kareena was the Club's first active member to ever win an Olympic Medal, and she did it in style.

JAC had a great year even though numerous Sundays were missed due to conditions and the State Championships were cancelled. Director Shaun Baker received the SLSQ Award of Excellence for the Nipper Program that the Club delivers, congratulations Shaun. His committee worked very well and was very ably supported by the new JAC administration assistant, Sheridan. The Seahorse Nipper program is also run under the JAC umbrella and this year, another two programs were able to be delivered successfully. The Nipper End of Year Awards were held at the 'J' and what a great venue it is for this event. Life Member Lenore Grice and I were invited to announce the new Captains and Vice Captains for 2022/23 to the audience and one of their first duties was to march with me and lay a wreath on Anzac Day.

Finally, and sadly I report that the Club lost two Life Members during the year being Mervyn Cummings and Terry Williams, I extend the Club's sympathies to their families. A vale for these two Life Members is included in our Annual Report.

Congratulations!!!!!! You have done it. We have completed another amazing season on Mudjimba Beach and achieved our primary goal of zero preventable deaths between the flags. A huge thank you to all members of Mudjimba SLSC for the ongoing support for our community in a season that has again presented many, many challenges. I appreciate the ongoing commitment to keeping our beach and community safe during extreme and challenging conditions that have affected members of our club directly with impacts on their homes, businesses, friends and family. Your efforts saved lives and provided care and support for communities in despair. I am immensely proud of your work and our service organisation. This was highlighted to me again on Anzac Day as our club paid respect to members and families of our armed forces so respectfully. I was approached following the ceremony by a community member who was rescued only one week prior by one of our SRC Members and who expressed enormous gratitude to me about our club and proficiency of our members. He explained, "He saved my life, I wouldn't be here today with his help, I am so grateful". This is why we choose to do what we do, we change people's lives, we save people's lives. I certainly hope you are proud to be part of our amazing surf club.

Whilst the 20/21 Season had its challenges, this report will outline the successes and achievements of the season. On a statistical level, with all the challenges presented to us, we were able to attract 180 Nippers to our Nipper Season on the very first weekend of our Nipper sign-on with the need to establish a waiting list for new Nippers to join our magnificent surf club. We saw our season membership increase by 2 % from last season with a 12 % increase in Junior Membership and just a small decrease in our Active Membership. We had a membership of 427 members in our fun, family friendly and community connected surf club. We performed 5 rescues during the season, performed 487 Preventative Actions with 36 583 community visitations (even with the weather we had), there were 26 Beach Closures, and 166 Public Relations actions. We had 4 ambulance responses and 14 First Aid Incidents.

Our Board of directors maintained a really clear focus on open and transparent communication with our priority work being on ensure high quality patrolling, members support and engagement and Nipper and Youth Development. The Board advocated strongly for our membership and club throughout the year and attempted to listen and act on all feedback provided. Thank you to your Board of Directors and Club Officers for their strong, passionate leadership of our club.

We were able to ensure high quality patrolling which was never more obvious than our club's outstanding performance in our Bulk Wilks Patrol Inspections!!!! We achieved 100%, 98% and 96% in our three inspections, this is our core purpose and to know we do this work at an outstanding level makes me immensely proud. We were able to ensure our club's patrolling equipment was of the highest standard through a combination of targeted financial investments and an enormous number of volunteer hours maintaining this equipment. Our Nipper Program was able to provide a high-quality program with a full enrolment of members through creative and innovative strategies to engage our Nippers even when mother nature was not very co-operative. In spite of 5 scheduled attempts to conduct our Club Championships this year, unfortunately mother nature did not give us a break and we end the season without conducting this year's Championships. We have outstanding Club Sponsors who continue to ensure our club remains a sustainable enterprise but have also grown our community engagement with many new community organisations partnering with us or utilising our club facilities.

Whilst we are proud of the season, your Board remains steadfast in our focus to grow our club membership and bring new members and leaders into our club. Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

Surf Life Saving Queensland Sunshine Coast Branch Inc applies Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. The entity is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on XX June 2022 by the Management Committee of the entity.

Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue

Operating grants, donations and bequests

When the entity receives operating grant revenue, donations or bequests, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance to AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the Entity:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant;
- recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement; and
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the Entity:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (for example AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138);
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the Entity recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Capital grant

When the Entity receives a capital grant, it recognises a liability for the excess of the initial carrying amount of the financial asset received over any related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer) recognised under other Australian Accounting Standards.

The Entity recognises income in profit or loss when or as the Entity satisfies its obligations under terms of the grant.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(b) Inventories

Inventories held for sale are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated, less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, are valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including buildings and plant and equipment but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Buildings	5%
Motor Vehicles	25%
Plant and equipment	20-40%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. Gains are not classified as revenue. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

(d) Employee Benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the company's obligation for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages, salaries and sick leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled.

The company's obligations for short-term employee benefits such as wages, salaries and annual leave are recognised as part of current trade and other payables in the statement of financial position.

Other long-term employee benefits

The entity classifies employees' long service leave and annual leave entitlements as other long-term employee benefits as they are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. Provision is made for the company's obligation for other long-term employee benefits, which are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee departures, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on high quality corporate bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Upon the remeasurement of obligations for other long-term employee benefits, the net change in the obligation is recognised in profit or loss classified under employee benefits expense.

The company's obligations for long-term employee benefits are presented as non-current liabilities in its statement of financial position, except where the entity does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period, in which case the obligations are presented as current liabilities.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

(f) Trade and Other Debtors

Trade and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from customers for goods sold.

Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

(h) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(i) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(j) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the company.

Opinion
