PRESIDENT'S REPORT

On 26 January this year, at Tallebudgera Beach, seven people were able to return home to their loved ones because of the heroic actions of our dedicated lifesavers.

Approximately 100 metres south of the rock wall at Tallebudgera, five people found themselves in trouble in a dangerous rip. Thanks to the quick thinking of our lifesavers, the IRB and Waverunner 3 were launched to assist them. Moments later two other swimmers were caught in the same rip and needed saving.

One of the swimmers lost consciousness and required resuscitation - thankfully this person made a full recovery.

If not for the fast thinking and highly trained lifesavers from Tallebudgera SLSC and Pacific SLSC, as well as the Operational Support volunteers, there could have been mass casualties and a very tragic outcome.

With members like this, it is truly an honour and a privilege to serve as President of SLSQ.

This is just one example of the outstanding work Queensland lifesavers have carried out this season and I am proud of each and every volunteer who has once again given up their time to save lives.

Our 9,504 active patrolling members continue to protect the bathing public and beachgoers, and go above and beyond in their service. They take time out of their busy lives to train, up-skill and give back to the community. Our lifesavers cover beach patrols, jet ski patrols, surfcom duties, and the list goes on. This is what our organisation is all about and I have no doubt that the Queensland community is richer because of our volunteers.

From the volunteers who cook BBQs for fundraising events to the members who take on leadership positions to help shape our organisation, and everything in between, I want to say THANK YOU! Without your support our iconic organisation wouldn't exist and your effort is truly valued.

The 2020/21 season had new and unique challenges with events having to be postponed or cancelled, but it has also provided opportunities for growth and innovation. While we were disappointed to see some surf sports carnivals cancelled, we were delighted to host one of the best State Championship events we have ever seen.

With a community atmosphere and renewed sense of passion, I was especially proud to see thousands of youth competitors at the 2021 Youth State Championships. The three day event brought together some very talented up and coming competitors in a variety of events, including the Matt Barclay U15 Ironman event. Matt Barclay was an extraordinary young man and will forever be in the hearts and minds of all lifesavers.

This season we will build on the new technology trialed last year and continue to work with stakeholders to improve our lifesaving capabilities. With positive results from drones and shark detecting technology, I'm excited for the future of SLSQ.

The SLSQ team has once again gone above and beyond to continue to grow and develop our organisation. I would like to thank the staff for their hard work and acknowledge that many of them also spend their time volunteering on the weekends at a club level.

Under the leadership of the State Council and the Board, SLSQ continues to strengthen its position as the peak body in coastal aquatic safety in Queensland. Thank you to all members who have served in these positions and I would especially like to acknowledge those who are moving on this year. Ken Hunter (Point Danger Branch), Leigh Schuch (Wide Bay Capricorn Branch) and Gary Morgan (North Barrier Branch) have shown outstanding leadership as State Councillors and I appreciate the significant contribution they have made to SLSQ.

I would also like to acknowledge Tanya O'Shea and Ally Muller who have served on the SLSQ Board and been instrumental in shaping the strategic direction of our organisation.

A highlight this year for SLSQ was our renewed partnership with the Queensland Government through a new four year Queensland Fire and Emergency Services Agreement. SLSQ will receive \$30 million over four years to continue to improve our lifesaving capabilities and protect beachgoers. This is on top of a \$6 million State Facilities Infrastructure Fund that will support some of our lifesaving facilities across the state.

As we look toward the 2021/22 season, I want to thank our sponsors, all levels of government and the community who continue to support our lifesavers. It is no secret that saving lives can be expensive and without this support our organisation wouldn't have the equipment it needed to save 2,704 lives during the 2020/21 season.

SLSQ is an iconic organisation but it is our 34,474 current members that make it exceptional. A wise man once told me "...at the end of the day, it all comes down to the two sticks in the sand". As you fly those red and yellow flags next season, remember that you are part of something great and be proud of your service.

CEO'S REPORT

2020/21 realised significant advancement of our organisation in line with our Strategic Plan 2020-2025. We modernised and became a company (limited by guarantee); advanced our constitution and by-laws while maintaining our not for profit status after being an association for more than 90 years. Corporate governance, risk management and transparency are now truly embedded as the foundation of our new operating framework.

To our 34,474 volunteers, our State Committees and Panels, we are deeply indebted to you for achieving our mission during the year – to save lives.

With 2,704 lives saved and 717,431 preventable actions, against a backdrop of COVID-19 disruption, you are the sole reason of our existence and the reason why many people get to go home to their loved ones after a day at the beach. We will continue to resource you effectively and assure that every decision we make is with the volunteers at the centre.

With that said, during the year we were very proud to announce a new multi-year agreement of \$30 million with Queensland Fire and Emergency Services and the Queensland State Government. It is the largest we have ever received and so deeply needed. In addition, we also received a two-year \$6 million State Facilities Grant taking our funding announcements to \$36 million for the year. We thank the State Government for their continued support, as they know, like we do, that without this vital funding and our volunteers, services would not be possible on our beaches.

As CEO of this inspiring organisation, in addition to the many volunteers that give up extraordinary hours off the beach, we could not have advanced or achieved our goals for the year without the stewardship of our Board. I thank President Mark Fife OAM for his leadership and drive and all Board members for dedicating their time to all of our sub committees and projects to drive and achieve our strategic objectives. I also pass on my thanks to all of our State Officers, committee and panel members for their service and dedication.

I also thank our 565 professional staff across Lifeguarding, Aviation, Training, Administration, Sport, Lifesaving, Membership, Community, Media and Marketing, Business Services and People and Culture. It is with you and our leadership team we were able to achieve some of the following highlights for SLSQ for the year:

- A 50% increase across four years for Lifesaving funding the new QFES and Facilities Grant;
- Flexible working arrangements and our response to COVID-19 both on and off the beach;
- The merger with our new drone technology partner and JV through the Ripper Corporation;
- The two-year extension of our Police Air contract to 2024;
- The strong financial turnaround of our Cairns Supporters Club and its continued growth;

- The appointment of our own investment manager and the ongoing encouraging results we are experiencing;
- Our brand refresh and sponsorship review now starting to yield results; and
- Our record financial result for the year allowing us to invest back into lifesaving and our mission – To Save Lives.

I am deeply indebted to Adam Weir – CEO Surf Life Saving Australia and all other state CEO's that came together weekly during the pandemic for your stewardship, advice and support. We truly know that in difficult times, the Federation comes together and rises to the challenge. We faced these and many more challenges together.

I wish to acknowledge retiring Branch President's Leigh Schuch and Gary Morgan for their many years of service to the State. To our Branch Councillors: I am excited about our future and what we can achieve together, and as I stated at our most recent meeting, we move forward together and bravely. I am humbled by your knowledge and sacrifice, and I know that we have some challenges ahead. However, that leadership, being present, communication and engagement is the path to greater success. With that said, I would like to finish by acknowledging retiring Point Danger Branch President Ken Hunter. Ken, you have been a pillar of our values (Leadership, Respect, Trust, Community, Safety and Teamwork) and you have forged instrumental change within our organisation that will continue on.

OPERATIONS REPORT

If progress lies not in enhancing what is, but in advancing toward what will be, our operations team are well positioned to execute the projects planned and collaborations created in 2021 for 2022.

I am proud to report that in October 2020 our partnership with Queensland Fire and Emergency Services was further secured with a four-year commitment worth \$30 million to SLSQ for the delivery of frontline services and public safety initiatives by our lifesavers. The shared alignment of goals between these two great organisations, who have been working in partnership together for years, will see positive outcomes reached for our communities over the next three years.

Our members passion and commitment are a large part of the success of operations and services on the beach. While my team and I were out on the beaches this year listening to lifesavers and asking about their experience, the message of enabling the futures of our clubs through accessible training, tools to do the job and pride in service to the community was clear and heartfelt.

Behind the scenes to support the frontline, LIMSOC was upgraded, with individualised sign on delivered now included in the service, enable wide area wireless capability, improved camera and mobile asset tracking technology and the ability to support connection with other emergency services piloted.

Further advancements on the frontline continued with a Memorandum of Understanding signed with City of Gold Coast for spontaneous volunteer's management in disaster management. This resulted in some of our members having the opportunity to be integrated in SAREX (Search and Rescue Exercise) training.

Our team also celebrated 10 years of the Brisbane Lifesaving Service in July. The service was created so that people from the Brisbane area could provide lifesaving support to clubs across south east Queensland.

On the frontline it has been a challenging year for all our lifesavers with 20 fatalities and many major incidents. Our hearts and thoughts are with the loved ones of those lost. Whist this is felt deeply for all our frontline teams, the responses to incidents highlighted the capacity of our members to respond and execute lengthy search operations in partnership with other services. In 2020/21our volunteer surf lifesavers rescued 833 swimmers in

In the regions, some of the highlights included the remediation of the operations support base at Muriel Henchman Park on the Gold Coast was completed; a joint off-season training at Tinaroo Dam for the North Queensland Branch took place in February, and we had the Tropic Chopper Tour, which visited six locations across the Queensland coastline.

This year SLSQ drone operations took a huge leap forward in partnership with the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries by launching a pilot program to track, record and identify marine activity for the SharkSmart program. Beach locations included Burleigh Heads, Southport, North Stradbroke Island, Alexandra Heads, Coolum, Alma Bay and Palm Cove. We had overwhelming public support for the program and believe it has boosted beachgoers' confidence. The drones will play an exciting role in the future as we work with Ripper Group and continue to innovate the tools and resources available to members in our operations for saving lives.

Our continued reputation for best practice led to many opportunities for advocacy for the SLSQ team including the release of the Coast Safe report, contributions to the National Water Safety Strategy 2030, providing advice to scientific working groups, panel contribution to the first state of volunteering report for Queensland and engaged actively to promote lifesaving at a local and state level.

In 2020/21 we introduced the innovated MEAL (Membership, Education, Admin, Lifesaving) program in North Queensland and North Barrier Branches. The forum covers all aspects of club life and focused on collaboration, quality and knowledge sharing.

Around the regions sustainable, fit for purpose facilities remain a focus, SLSQ successfully acquired a lease over a site designated for lifesaving use at Bokarina Beach, an exciting opportunity for our members. Moore Park SLSC has secured funding to rebuild its club house after many years of seeking funding to address issues caused by cyclone damage. The new facility will allow the club to grow and engage with the local community. In North Barrier SLSQ purchased a building for the region with the official opening planned before close of 2021, providing members an asset for the future and a great space to engage and be profiled in one of Queensland's largest regional centres, Townsville.

The Community Awareness team have had a pivotal year of change. The team have experienced expansion in every program; moved to paperless sign-on and new ways to audit and report. The team met and delivered goals in all areas, growing Little Lifesavers participation by close to 200%, launched a highly successful Seniors program on the Sunshine Coast, which will be shared with the rest of Queensland and aligned the water safe schools' program to the Queensland Education Department curriculum. In July following a tragedy in Bamaga in North Queensland, the team were contacted by QFES and have developed a bespoke Beach to Cape program to be delivered in future to help build understanding of water safety in far north Queensland communities.

As a leader, it is exciting to see our strategic plan in action and coming to life through each of you in the extension of thinking, collaboration, advancement and growth of capability in the front line. COMMERCIAL REPORT

In my role of General Manager-Commercial I manage three key commercial areas of the organisation which include Education (First Aid, CPR and TAE courses), the Lifeguard service and the Westpac Lifesaver Rescue Helicopter Service.

AUSTRALIAN LIFESAVING ACADEMY QUEENSLAND (ALAQ)

In 2020/21 ALAQ passed our audit from Australian Skills Quality Authority, the regulators for Registered Training Organisations (RTOs), which was a huge achievement for our team.

We also upgraded the units of competency for emergency care, which required a re-write for all assessment materials.

COVID-19 had a continued effect on the way we deliver our training but we modified to suit the relevant legislation.

We advanced our delivery of Cert IV in Training and Assessment via a blended delivery using online options and have experienced a record number of registrations to study.

AUSTRALIAN LIFEGUARD SERVICE QUEENSLAND

Thank you to all of our fantastic lifeguards who have kept our beaches safe this year. SLSQ lifeguards patrol at 84 locations across the Queensland coastline.

A big achievement this past year was 10 of our lifeguards obtaining their drone pilot licence, taking the total to 28 lifeguards across Queensland. This is a huge advancement for the delivery of our service

We were proud to have thirteen lifeguards receive a national medal from the Prime Ministers' office for service greater than 15 years. Well done to all.

In the 2020/21 season, we underwent a restructure on the Sunshine Coast/Noosa area and appointed Anthony King as Chief Lifeguard – Sunshine Coast with two supervisors, Trent Robinson and Rhys Drury. Greg Cahill position was renamed from Chief Lifeguard to Head of Lifeguard Operations.

WESTPAC LIFESAVER RESCUE HELICOPTER SERVICE

We secured a new EC-135 Helicopter which has become Lifesaver 46 based on the Sunshine Coast. This matches the existing EC-135 based Lifesaver 45 based out of Carrara.

In June 2021, the new helicopter ventured across the Queensland coastline on the Tropic Chopper Tour visiting six regional centres including Bundaberg, Yeppoon, Mackay, Townsville, Cairns and Port Douglas. The schools and community in these regions appreciated seeing the helicopter in person and meeting the pilots and crew.

Throughout the year we were also granted a certificate of approval to allow us to deliver pilot training, known as a Part 141, in our twin-engine helicopters, which enables us to continue training our current group of pilots.

As part of our continual improvement, we have hired an engineer who is the HAAMC (Head of Aircraft Airworthiness Maintenance Controller) Karl Olsen. Karl has had experience working on our helicopters previously as a contractor to our engineers.

MEDIA AND MARKETING REPORT

Surf Life Saving Queensland's media, marketing and fundraising initiatives have been advanced in 2020/21 thanks to key projects.

SOCIAL MEDIA AND MEMBER COMMUNICATIONS

The introduction of Local Legends and more member focused content has been hugely successful in highlighting the achievements of our volunteers. This has resulted in 23% growth in followers and a 96% increase in engagement across SLSQ's social media. The introduction of Member Mail (a weekly email update to members on all circulars and key information from the week) has also seen member engagement increase.

SUMMER SAFETY CAMPAIGN

In keeping with the theme of advancement, SLSQ partnered with the Queensland Maroons to implement a robust Summer Safety campaign that included the use of talent (Wally Lewis, Gordon Tallis, Trevor Gillmeister and Kevin Walters), targeted digital promotion, and a comprehensive advertising schedule. The campaign tagline, "she'll be right, wont save your life" resonated with both our members and the public alike. The script, production of the TVC and development of the creative were all managed by the SLSQ Marketing/Media team and targeted the key demographic of males 50 years and over. This campaign enabled SLSQ to build a significant public database with 7,000 people signing up to our eDM's for beach safety updates.

STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS 2021

In keeping in line with the implementation of the Surf Sports Strategy, the State Championships 2021 were launched with a rebranded, vibrant and fresh look alongside the tagline "The glory days are back". The marketing and sports teams worked hard to enhance the experience at the State Champs, implementing a Festival Zone with rides, market stalls, live music and roving

The team also oversaw six days of live streaming. For the Youth event the live stream had a total of 94,000 views and for our Seniors and Masters secured 88,000 total views, a testament to the interest in the events. From a media perspective, there were 618 stories mentioning State Championships across Queensland.

The State Championships were also back on free to air TV for the first time in many years. SLSQ secured a 2-hour finals package on national TV that put the SLSQ brand back on a national stage. Our SBS coverage had a cumulative reach audience of 165,727.

SURF WOMAN OF THE YEAR

The Surf Woman of the Year program advanced from "Surf Girl" to Surf Woman in 2020/21. Following the rebrand late last year, it was pleasing to see entrants increased from 8 in 19/20 to 18 in 20/21. The program has evolved to have a much stronger focus on professional development, mentoring and relationship building. Feedback from this year will be implemented to ensure the program is even in 21/22.

SOS WEEK 2020

The team were proud to surpass last year's fundraising total (30% increase for clubs, 49% increase for corporates) in the midst of COVID-19. The implementation of workshops to teach marketing and fundraising tactics and the introduction of Raisely to assist the clubs to fundraise online were particularly valuable initiatives that contributed to this positive result.

MERCHANDISE STORE

An online merchandise store was launched just in time for Christmas. This merchandise not only offers a great gift option for our members but also creates brand awareness and funding for our organisation.

PARTNERSHIPS

Surf Life Saving Queensland was delighted to retain long-standing relationships with Westpac, DHL, Queensland Health and The Star Gold Coast. In 2020/21 we welcomed new national partners Ampol and Isuzu and in Queensland FINZ, Sharkskin, Diageo and Kumon. We also built charity and fundraising partnerships with Magic Millions, XXXX and Cooly Rocks On.

Moving forward we look forward to exploring further partnership opportunities to allow us to expand on our surf safety, educational, sporting and fundraising initiatives.

MEMBERSHIP AND SPORT REPORT

In 2020/21 our Membership and Sport team continued to work through a year of interruptions. I was really proud with their ability to adapt and change to operate in the new COVID environment and both departments were still able to deliver great results.

Whilst we noticed a slight decline in our active patrolling members, our Nipper numbers and overall membership grew by 1% YOY. Our overall number reaching a new record of 34,474.

Education is central to the success of our clubs and members as the emergency managers of our beaches. The enormous undertaking in educating our members is underpinned by the dedication and passion of our volunteer trainers, assessors and facilitators. These individuals have not only contributed countless hours to the teaching of fellow members in essential lifesaving skills but also to continued personal and professional development within the scope of our RTO.

Our sport team did an incredible job to work with Queensland Health to put together the Aquatic Industry Plan for all our water sports. This effectively allowed SLSQ to deliver a full calendar of sport in 2020/2021.

MEMBERSHIP

- Membership, Marketing and the Meritorious Committee should be commended for the way they moved the Awards of Excellence online in an SLSQ first. This ensured we were still able to continue to celebrate our members for their outstanding achievements and contribution for the season.
- Sustainability Project continues to evolve with two sub projects completed.
- We updated and refined our policies and procedures down to 89 and uploaded them to a central portal on the SLSQ App for clubs to reference easily.
- We saw the implementation of our Learning Management system during 2020/21. Members can now access 45 'etrainu' courses focused on professional learning and development.

MEMBER EDUCATION

A robust program is in place to overview the thousands of active members skills maintenance assessments and nipper competencies. These essential activities are achieved through the assistance of Endorsed Delegates and Junior Activity Accreditation Officers.

- In totality 18211 member education awards were processed in season 2020/21 including 1,301 new Bronze Medallion holders and 9,350 nipper age awards.
- In line with legislation changes with Child Youth Risk Management Strategy (CYRMS) a review of our policies and procedures has been completed and a new CYRMS training for Bluecard holders will be released ahead of the upcoming season.
- SLSQ has been working with National Association for Prevention of Child abuse and Neglect (NAPCAN) to provide training to staff from the Board down and out to volunteers holding key committee positions.
- Our Peer Support program was redeveloped with new training and promotional materials to better protect the mental health of our valued lifesaving volunteers.

SPORT

- We unveiled our 2021-23 sport strategy developed in conjunction with key sports stakeholders including the Sports Committee, Officials, Coaches, Branches, SLSQ Board Members and staff.
- We dodged inclement weather and COVID outbreaks to execute one of our biggest Queensland State Championships to date over two weekends, three venues, six days of competition and 3000+ competitors.
- The State Championships included an event rebrand, tagline, new Festival Zone, improved event overlay and a live stream (182,000 views) and Broadcast on SBS (165,000
- We trialed Live Heats technology at the Boardriding and the Queensland State Championship events with resounding success. 13,000 individual users joined the platform with almost 500, 000 page views of the event. We will continue to challenge our manual processes and push to find technology-based solutions.
- Initial planning and preparation around the 2024 World Championships on the Gold Coast has commenced. A Local Organising Committee is now in place and consultation and formal meetings with International Lifesaving Federation have started.

2021 is already shaping up to be another exciting year.

PEOPLE AND CULTURE REPORT

Surf Life Saving Queensland is a diverse organisation which has more than 500 employees within major cities and regional centres across the State. Our employees range from lifeguards, pilots, operations, media, marketing, community awareness, lifesaving, sport, finance, administration, education, people & culture and membership.

Modernisation and advancement is at the core of what we do and assists in uniting the organisation. We work within a cultural environment which continues to evolve and grow, in addition to navigating through the changing political, social, technological and economic climate, all of which has a knock-on effect to the people element of our organisation.

Pleasingly, this year in our Engagement Survey, we achieved an increase on our 2019 engagement score from 66% up to 71%. We are actively tracking toward our goal of 80%.

The implementation of technology in the form of Culture Amp and Employment Hero is key to advancing the People & Culture and Payroll function for our 500+ employees. Employment Hero will offer a new payroll and Human Resources Information System resulting in streamlined processes, providing clarity around employee information while ensuring security and confidentiality of our employee information.

The introduction of Culture Amp to collect information relating to Employee Engagement has allowed us to ask more pertinent questions relating to engagement and provides a structure where deep analysis of acquired data is possible.

A focus on Diversity and Inclusion has taken shape through the creation of a Diversity and Inclusion statement, which will inform part of our culture, through thinking about "who we are" and allowing us to further shape our identity at SLSQ.

As always, ensuring compliance with the ever-changing industrial relations landscape is a core requirement within People & Culture. This year, we renegotiated our Enterprise Agreement, allowing us to further advance and offer the employees of the Lifeguard Service entitlements which not only fit their day-to-day operational requirements, but also allow a focus into future wellbeing to ensure career longevity.

Lastly, the introduction of Employee of the Month awards has been key to recognising the incredible efforts of our staff and more importantly, how we knit together as a team to achieve great things and keep our organisation on the beaches, in the skies and more importantly, saving lives.

BUSINESS SERVICES REPORT

FINANCIAL SERVICES

A number of projects were delivered during the year to streamline and improve upon transactional processes and systems. There has been a strong focus on technology with the accounting system being migrated into the Cloud; the accounting system being upgraded and dashboard reporting being implemented. Late in the year Expense Manager and EFTsure software was implemented going into early FY22, providing automation and workflow managed processes for all expense and procurement activities.

There continues to be a focus on cost management and to deliver an 'efficiency dividend' which has realised savings and efficiencies with the new Auditor and IT service provider.

An expanded investment structure was established under Wilsons Advisory the new investment manager, with SLSQ realising significant return on investment in FY21.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The SLSQ Operations Risk function supports our business to manage and effectively mitigate risk and critical safety hazards.

The ability to effectively identify and manage risk is a vital element to our business success. Risk management takes place in many different forms and processes, from beach to Boardroom, and all other aspects of our operations.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Risk Management enhanced the profile and importance of risk organisationally by developing understanding and visibility through staff and volunteer engagement, implementing escalation models and improving risk reporting systems at all levels.
- Safety Management identification and addressing of critical risk and safety hazards across both professional and volunteer personnel through the provision of professional guidance from COVID-19, to event and sport management.

 Assurance Management – undertook detailed analysis of SLSQ systems, processes and people functions through reviews and audits of; the operations quality system, the insurance portfolio and specific Club activities such as the provision of accommodation services to measure and improve our compliance to standards and regulation.

DEVELOPMENTS AND INITIATIVES

- Re-investment of capital into growth assets to maximise returns and deliver new income streams in support of life saving activities.
- Improvements in internal reporting and variance analysis to better inform re-forecasting initiatives.
- Roll out of key safety and risk management initiatives and training.
- Re-investment in technology to ensure all staff have the tools of trade they require to perform their roles.
- Re-alignment of strategic partners for audit services, aviation consulting, investment and information technology support and management.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

With a membership base of 34,474, SLSQ is one of the largest volunteer-based community organisations in Queensland. Control of SLSQ is vested in the Board of Directors which is accountable to the State Council which, in turn, represents the members.

The role of the State Council

The State Council comprises the SLSQ President and the six Branch Presidents. As the voting members of SLSQ, its duties include electing the Board and Life Members, and approving changes to the constitution. Representing the interests of the six branches and, ultimately the clubs, the Council met on four occasions throughout

The role of the Board and Committees

SLSQ's Board and Committee structure is critical to ensuring volunteer representation in key decisions and strategic planning. The various committees outlined on page 22 are established by the Board to assist SLSQ in the operational management of the volunteers. Where necessary, the Board can establish special purpose committees and panels to oversee the management of projects, programs or other initiatives.

The primary function of the Board is to govern and provide leadership to SLSQ, members, affiliated branches and clubs in accordance with the aims and strategic objectives of SLSQ, its constitution, and the law. The Board is responsible for acting on all issues in accordance with SLSQ's objectives. It operates for the benefit of SLSQ, its members and the wider Queensland

The role of Directors and management

SLSQ's CEO is tasked with managing the day-to-day business requirements of SLSQ, under the direction of the Board. The President is the nominated head of SLSQ and the SLSQ Board is responsible for the appointment of a CEO to manage and administer the organisation. The CEO is accountable to the Board and reports to the Board at each meeting. The CEO ensures the resolutions of the Board are properly and efficiently carried out, and transacts all business of SLSQ between Board meetings and general meetings of the Council.

Board Composition

SLSQ's Board comprises the President, the Deputy President, the Director of Finance, four Directors, up to two Independent Directors, the Company Secretary and the CEO, who is a non-voting member. A Director must be a member of SLSQ, and Independent Directors may or may not be individual members of SLSQ.

Board Meetings and access to management

The Board meets as often as is deemed necessary in every calendar year for the dispatch of business. At any time, five Directors may ask the CEO to convene a meeting of the Board and, subject to SLSQ's Constitution, questions at any meeting are decided by a majority of votes by the Board of Directors.

Code of Conduct

Nominees for Director positions are required to agree to SLSQ's 'Code of Conduct' for Directors. Candidates must sign their acceptance to comply with this code on their nomination form. The Code of Conduct is contained within the Directors' Handbook, which is provided to all Directors upon their election at the annual general meeting.

Independence

At the commencement of each Board meeting, the Chair asks for Directors to declare conflicts of interest in any agenda items.

The Council may elect up to two Independent Directors each year. Nominees for these positions shall be endorsed and recommended to the Council by the Board.

Independent Advice

SLSQ's Board and management are assisted in aspects of its operations with external advice.

Auditors BDO conduct an annual audit, providing the Board with independent assurance and advice on financial management matters.

Notes to and forming part of the Consolidated Financial Statements for the Period Ended 30 June 2021

Surf Life Saving Queensland Limited - trading as Surf Life Saving Queensland (the 'Company') - is a public company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia under the Corporations Act 2001.

The Company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The Directors' present the consolidated financial statements of the Group, comprising Surf Life Saving Queensland (SLSQ) and its controlled entities for the period ended 30 June 2021.

The principal activities of the Company were that of the state's aquatic rescue authority. Our organisation encompasses several diverse arms - lifesaving services, community education, membership services, surf sports, fundraising and commercial training - but they all contribute to one overarching purpose to save lives. No significant changes in the nature of those activities occurred during the period.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on the date shown in the Directors' Declaration.

Significant changes is state of affairs

Effective from the 20th January 2021, SLSQ changed from an association registered under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Qld), to a public company limited by guarantee under ASIC and the Corporations Act 2001. As part of the change in Constitution; SLSQ has moved the balance date from 31 May to 30 June. Accordingly, the financial report is for the period from 1 June 2020 to 30 June 2021, with the comparative period being from 1 June 2019 to 31 May 2020.

On 16 February 2021, SLSQ acquired an interest in Ripper Corporation for \$0.255m cash and a further deferred amount of \$0.765m cash subject to performance criteria over 36 months from acquisition.

A two year interest only loan facility of \$5.5m was established with Westpac Banking Corporation for the purpose of acquiring a helicopter. The loan facility expires on 8 March 2023, with monthly interest repayments commencing from March 2021. The interest rates under the facility are variable.

No other significant changes in state of affairs of the Company occurred during the period.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of preparation

This general purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board for distribution to the members to fulfil the financial reporting requirements under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the Australian Accounting Standards Board has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for cashflow information have been prepared on an accrual basis of accounting and are based on historical costs and the going concern assumption. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous period.

The financial report is presented in Australian dollars (\$).

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Australian dollars using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at financial period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss.

The Company is a kind referred to in the ASIC Corporations (Rounding in Financial Reports) Instrument 2016/191 and in accordance with that instrument, amounts in the financial report have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars, unless otherwise stated

New accounting standards and interpretations

Changes in accounting policies, new and amended standards and interpretations

The Company has adopted all of the new, revised or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period, including those discussed below:

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the amounts recognised in prior periods and are not expected to significantly affect the current or future periods of the Company.

Initial adoption of AASB 2020-04 COVID-19 - Related Rent Concessions

AASB 2020-4 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards - Covid-19- Related Rent Concessions amends AASB 16 by providing a practical expedient that permits lessees to assess whether rent concessions that occur as a direct consequence of the COVID-19 pandemic and, if certain conditions are met, account for those rent concessions as if they were not lease modifications.

Initial adoption of AASB 2018-6 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Definition of a **Business**

AASB 2018-6 amends and narrows the definition of a business specified in AASB 3 Business Combinations, simplifying the determination of whether a transaction should be accounted for as a business combination or an asset acquisition. Entities may also perform a calculation and elect to treat certain acquisitions as acquisitions of assets.

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate all of the assets, liabilities and results of the parent (Surf Life Saving Queensland) and all of the controlled entities. The parent controls an entity when it is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. A list of the controlled entities is provided in Note 17.

The assets, liabilities and results of all subsidiaries are fully consolidated into the financial statements of the Group from the date on which control is obtained by the Group. The consolidation of a subsidiary is discontinued from the date that control ceases. Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains or losses on transactions between group entities are fully eliminated on consolidation. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed and adjustments made where necessary to ensure uniformity of the accounting policies adopted by the Group.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(d) Current versus non-current classification

The Group presents assets and liabilities in the statement of financial position based on current/non-current classification.

An asset is current when it is:

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Group's normal operating cycle;
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in the Group's normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Group classifies all other assets and liabilities as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and short-term deposits in the statement of financial position comprise cash at banks, cash on hand and short-term deposits with a maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts if applicable.

Financial instruments (f)

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain a significant financing component.

Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities, which consist of trade and other payables and lease liabilities, are subsequently measured at amortised

Financial assets

Financial assets, consist of trade and other receivables and equity and debt/hybrid instrument investments.

Trade and other receivables, which generally have thirty day terms, are subsequently measured at amortised cost less an allowance for impairment.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

For equity instruments not held for trading, or not contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which AASB 3 applies; at initial recognition, the Group may elect to make an irrevocable election to measure the equity instruments in other comprehensive income (OCI), while the dividend revenue received on underlying equity instruments will still be recognised in profit or loss.

The Group classifies the following investments as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL):

- Investments that are held for trading; and
- Equity investments for which the entity has not elected to recognise fair value gains and losses through other comprehensive income (OCI).

Derecognition

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A liability is derecognised when it is extinguished (i.e. when the obligation in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires). An exchange of an existing financial liability for a new one with substantially modified terms, or a substantial modification to the terms of a financial liability, is treated as an extinguishment of the existing liability and recognition of a new financial liability.

The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognised when the holder's contractual rights to its cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred in such a way that all the risks and rewards of ownership are substantially transferred.

All the following criteria need to be satisfied for the derecognition of a financial asset:

- The right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired or been transferred;
- All risk and rewards of ownership of the asset have been substantially transferred; and
- The Group no longer controls the asset (i.e. it has no practical ability to make unilateral decisions to sell the asset to a third party).

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss. On derecognition of a financial asset at fair value through profit or loss, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of an investment in equity which was elected to be classified under fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investments revaluation reserve is not reclassified to profit or loss, but is transferred to retained earnings.

Impairment

The Group recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses.

The Group uses the simplified approach to impairment, as applicable under AASB 9: Financial Instruments. The simplified approach does not require tracking of changes in credit risk at every reporting period, but instead requires the recognition of lifetime expected credit loss at all times. This approach is applicable to trade receivables.

In measuring the expected credit loss, a provision matrix for trade receivables is used taking into consideration various data to get to an expected credit loss.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(g) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Such cost includes the cost of replacing part of the property, plant and equipment and borrowing costs for long-term construction projects if the recognition criteria are met. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Group recognises such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Land and buildings are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation on buildings and impairment losses recognised.

Depreciation is calculated over the estimated useful life of the assets as follows:

The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial period end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Impairment

The carrying values of property, plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated when events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired. The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in

Impairment exists when the carrying value of an asset or cash exceeds its estimated recoverable amount. The asset is then written down to its recoverable amount. Impairment losses, if any, are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as a separate line item.

Derecognition and disposal

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset is included in profit or loss in the period the asset is derecognised.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(h) Intangible assets

Intellectual property acquired outside a business combination is recognised at cost. Intangible assets acquired in a business combination are recognised separately from goodwill and capitalised at fair value as at the date of acquisition.

Acquired in a business combination and or separately

The Group's major intangible assets is intellectual property.

The useful lives of these intangible assets are assessed, and the asset is amortised over its useful life on a straight-line basis.

Intangible assets are tested for impairment where an indicator of impairment exists. Useful lives are also examined on an annual basis and adjustments, where applicable, are made on a prospective basis.

Goodwill

Goodwill is initially recorded at the moment by which the purchase consideration for a business combination exceeds the fair value attributed to its nets assets at date of acquisition. Following initial recognition, goodwill is measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. Goodwill is not amortised.

Goodwill is tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired.

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific assets to which it relates. All other expenditure, including expenditure on internally generated goodwill and brands, is recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

Right-of-use assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter.

The consolidated entity has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of twelve months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

If ownership of the right-of-use asset is transferred to the Group, then the right-of-use asset is depreciated over its useful

(i) **Employee benefit liabilities**

Short-term benefits

Liabilities for salaries and wages, including annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within twelve months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term benefits

The liability for long service leave not expected to be settled within twelve months of the reporting date are measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Consideration is given to the expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures, and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on corporate bonds with terms to maturity and currencies that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Lease liabilities

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the consolidated entity's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following: future lease payments arising from a change in a rate used; lease term; certainty of a purchase option and termination penalties. When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down.

Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Group is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer.

Revenue is recognised at a point in time, when the transfer of promised goods or services to customers has been delivered. Other revenue is recognised when the right to receive the revenue has been established.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Contributed Assets

The entity receives assets from the government and other parties for nil or nominal consideration in order to further its objectives. These assets are recognised in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards.

On initial recognition of an asset, the Entity recognises related amounts being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer.

The Entity recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amounts.

Operating Grants, Donations and Bequests

Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

When the entity receives operating grant revenue, donations or bequests, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance to AASB 15,

When both these conditions are satisfied, the Entity:

- -identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant;
- -recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement; and
- -recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the Entity:

- -recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards;
- -recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- -recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the Entity recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Capital Grant

Revenue received for capital grants is recognised upon acquisition of the underlying asset within the statement of comprehensive income.

When the Entity receives a capital grant, it recognises a liability for the excess of the initial carrying amount of the financial asset received over any related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer) recognised under other Australian Accounting Standards.

Interest Income

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Dividend Income

The Entity recognises dividends in profit or loss only when the Entity's right to receive payment of the dividend is established.

(m) Taxes

Income tax

Surf Life Saving Queensland is exempt from income tax pursuant to Section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Surf Life Saving Queensland is a Public Benevolent Institution (PBI) and has been endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office to receive tax concessions.

Further, Surf Life Saving Queensland is endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR).

Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except:

- When the GST incurred on a sale or purchase of assets or services is not payable to or recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO), in which case the GST is recognised as part of the revenue or the expense item or as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset, as applicable.
- When receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position. Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is classified as part of operating cash flows.

Interest-bearing loans and borrowings

All loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs.

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fees paid on the establishment of loan facilities that are yield related are included as part of the carrying amount of the loans and borrowings.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Group has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(o) Fair value of assets and liabilities

The entity measures some of its assets and liabilities at fair value on either a recurring or non-recurring basis, depending on the requirements of the applicable Accounting Standard.

"Fair value" is the price the entity would receive to sell an asset or would have to pay to transfer a liability in an orderly (i.e. unforced) transaction between independent, knowledgeable and willing market participants at the measurement date.

As fair value is a market-based measure, the closest equivalent observable market pricing information is used to determine fair value. Adjustments to market values may be made having regard to the characteristics of the specific asset or liability. The fair values of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data.

To the extent possible, market information is extracted from the principal market for the asset or liability (i.e. the market with the greatest volume and level of activity for the asset or liability). In the absence of such a market, market information is extracted from the most advantageous market available to the company at the end of the reporting period.

The fair value of liabilities and the entity's own equity instruments (if any) may be valued, where there is no observable market price in relation to the transfer of such financial instruments, by reference to observable market information where such instruments are held as assets. Where this information is not available, other valuation techniques are adopted and, where significant, are detailed in the respective note to the financial statements.

(p) Comparative figures

Where necessary, comparative information has been restated to conform with changes in presentation in the current period.

(q) Financial risk management objectives and policies

Surf Life Saving Queensland's principal financial instruments comprise receivables, payables, cash and short-term deposits, lease liabilities, interest bearing loan and borrowings and investments held in equities. Surf Life Saving Queensland manages its exposure to key financial risks in accordance with the financial risk management policy.

The main risks arising from Surf Life Saving Queensland's financial instruments are credit risk, liquidity risk and price risk. Surf Life Saving Queensland uses different methods to measure and manage different types of risks to which it is exposed. These include ageing analyses and monitoring of specific credit allowances undertaken to manage credit risk. Liquidity risk is monitored through the development of rolling cash flow forecasts. The Board reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks.

Credit risk arises from the financial assets of Surf Life Saving Queensland, which comprise cash and cash equivalents, trade and other receivables. Surf Life Saving Queensland's exposure to credit risk arises from potential default of the counter party, with a maximum exposure equal to the carrying amount of these instruments.

Surf Life Saving Queensland trades only with recognised, creditworthy third parties, and as such collateral is not requested nor is it Surf Life Saving Queensland's policy to securitise its trade and other receivables. In addition, receivable balances are monitored on an ongoing basis with the result that Surf Life Saving Queensland's exposure to bad debts is not significant. There are no significant concentrations of credit risk within Surf Life Saving Queensland.

Liquidity risk arises from the timing differences between cash inflows and cash outflows. Surf Life Saving Queensland's objective is to maintain a balance between continuity of funding and flexibility. The Board has in place working capital and reinvestment targets and regularly monitors forward cash flow forecasts.

Equity securities price risks arise from investments in equity securities. To limit this risk Surf Life Saving Queensland diversifies its portfolio in accordance with limits set by the Board in conjunction with its investment fund manager Wilsons; who report and present to the Board quarterly. The majority of the equity investments is of a high quality and is publicly traded on the ASX. The price risk appears immaterial in terms of a possible impact on profit and loss and as such a sensitivity analysis has not been completed.

Primary responsibility for identification and control of financial risk rests with the Board. The Board reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks identified.

Note 1: Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(r) COVID-19 Impact

The COVID-19 outbreak and the resulting government restrictions have had a significant impact on the Australian economy and consequentially the Surf Life Saving 2021 operations.

Surf Life Saving Queensland's operations were affected across most areas with parts of lifeguarding, community services and the Australian Lifesaving Academy heavily impacted. Support in the way of the Federal Jobkeeper grant was instrumental, for a period, in ensuring SLSQ staff were able to continue to offer life saving services.

Note 2: Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the Group's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

(a) Estimation of useful lives or assets

The estimation of the useful lives of assets has been based on historical experience as well as manufacturers' warranties (for plant, equipment and helicopters), lease terms (for leased equipment). In addition, the condition of the assets is assessed at least once per year and considered against the remaining useful life. Adjustments to useful lives are made prospectively, if appropriate.

(b) Impairment of leasehold improvements - controlled entity

Impairment indicators were not identified relating to the carrying value of the leasehold improvements for the Cairns S.L.S. Supporters Club Inc.

An impairment assessment was performed, with a recoverable amount determined based on value-in-use calculations. In determining value-in-use, projected future cash flows are discounted using a risk adjusted discount rate.

From this impairment assessment, an impairment expense of property, plant and equipment of \$Nil (2020: \$Nil) has been recognised.

(c) Impairment of helicopter equipment

In the prior financial year, impairment indicators were identified relating to the carrying value of the helicopter models, contained within the plant and equipment class of property, plant and equipment.

An impairment assessment was performed, with a market value determined based on an independent valuation report produced on the 22 May 2020.

From this impairment assessment, an impairment expense of property, plant and equipment of \$728 thousand was recognised in FY20.

In the current financial, no impairment assessment was required as the helicopters were fully written down.

(d) Impairment of helicopter rotable equipment

Impairment indicators were identified relating to the carrying value of the rotable equipment, contained within the plant and equipment class of property, plant and equipment.

An impairment assessment was performed and from this impairment assessment, an impairment expense of property, plant and equipment of \$655 thousand (2020: \$Nil) has been recognised.

(e) Value of assets in Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc at date of gaining control

As disclosed in Note 17, Surf Life Saving Queensland obtained control of Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc on 28 October 2015. The judgement has been made that the property, plant and equipment of Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc had a \$nil value in use at 28 October 2015. This judgement is made as the Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc is not generating significant surpluses.

On the 7th July 2021, the Annual General Meeting of Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc was held where the Management Committee by representation of Surf Life Saving Queensland senior management stepped down and a new Management was installed.

(f) Control of Ripper Corporation

Note 4.2, Surf Life Saving Queensland obtained control of Ripper Corp effective 16 February 2021. As per the business sale agreement, the intellectual property (IP) of Ripper had a \$1.78m value in use at 16 February 2021 and remains at that value at 30 June 2021.

(g) Recognition of revenue

When assessing revenue, management exercises judgement to determine whether the performance obligation is sufficiently specific by taking into account any conditions specified in the arrangement, explicit or implicit, regarding the promised goods or services. In making this assessment, management includes the nature/type, cost/value, quantity and the period of transfer related to the goods or services promised.

(h) Trade and other receivables

As disclosed in Note 5, management exercises judgement in measurement of the expected credit loss allowances for trade and other receivables.

The Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc is considered a controlled entity by way of control of the Management Committee by representation of Surf Life Saving Queensland senior management and the ability to control the day to day finance, and operations of the Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc. Control was obtained on 28 October 2015.

On the 7th July 2021, the Annual General Meeting of Agnes Water Surf Life Saving Club Inc was held where the Management Committee by representation of Surf Life Saving Queensland senior management stepped down and a new Management committee was endorsed by its members.

Effective the 16 February 2021, the Group acquired a 51% interest in 'Ripper Corp', a business leader in drone search and rescue deployment, training, research and development. SLSQ aims to integrate operations with Ripper Corp, unlocking their state-of-the-art drone and hi- tech Al applications into existing surf lifesaving operations and wider disaster responses. Based on the acquisition agreement of Ripper Corp, SLSQ has 51% of the voting rights and has executive managerial representation on the board. These voting rights and management representation allow SLSQ to set business objectives, approve budgets and direct projects. Further, SLSQ manage Ripper's internal processes; and the Service agreements between the two entities support that SLSQ controls Ripper. Therefore, SLSQ meets the requirements of AASB10 for control and is required to consolidate for statutory account purposes.

Note 18: Capital Commitments

At 30 June 2021, the Group had capital commitments of \$6.44m for two helicopters (2020: \$1.626m). Further expenditure will be incurred to bring the aviation asset ready for use.

Note 19: Contingent Liabilities

Surf Life Saving Queensland had no contingent liabilities as at the reporting date which would have a material effect on the Group's financial statements as at 30 June 2021 (2020: \$Nil).

We confirm that the independence declaration, which has been given to the directors of the Company, would be in the same terms if given to the directors as at the time of this auditor's report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of the Directors for the Financial Report

The directors of the Company are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and the Australian Charities and Non-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the directors are responsible for assessing the ability of the Group to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Group or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.
