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OUR FIVE CLUBS

The North Queensland Branch was established on the 30th September 1950. Representatives of the three clubs were present: **Cairns, Etty Bay, and Mission Beach**. S. Flegler was elected as the first Branch President. With 3 clubs minimum required to maintain a branch the number of clubs was boosted to four in 1952 with the formation of Yorkeys Knob SLSC. Members from Yorkeys Knob SLSC were

instrumental in forming **Ellis Beach SLSC in 1957**, and Yorkeys ceased to exist. **The branch gained a fifth club in 1980** when the **Port Douglas SLSC** was established. The club was allocated a small block of land on the foreshore of Four Mile Beach.









PRESIDENT REPORT

The 2024 season has been one of growth, resilience, and strong collaboration across our clubs. Despite early challenges, we strengthened our programs, increased engagement, and laid a solid foundation for the future.

We began the season with the Awards of Excellence, celebrating the dedication of our volunteers. A special commendation was awarded to those involved in the Emergency Response efforts during severe flooding, underscoring the vital role our lifesaving community plays beyond the beach.

This year also marked major milestones for two of our clubs:

Cairns SLSC - 100th Anniversary

Mission Beach SLSC - 80th Anniversary

These celebrations highlighted the enduring strength and legacy of surf lifesaving in North Queensland.

A key focuses this season was Junior Activities Development. We introduced the first Age Managers Clinic and organised a Junior Activities coordinator trip to the Gold Coast, providing our leaders of our young members with valuable exposure to large-scale nipper programs. The second Northern Youth Southern Experience (NYSE) was also a success, fostering connections with southern clubs and developing the next generation of lifesavers. With even more planned for the coming season, I look forward to seeing this space continue to grow.

In sport, we saw strong participation across the region, with the return of two pool rescue carnivals and five beach carnivals, including the inaugural paddle around Dunk Island at Mission Beach. We also expanded athlete development opportunities through clinics and competitions.

It was another significant year for patrol operations, and I commend all our active members for their dedication to keeping our beaches safe. Congratulations to those who achieved their first award or new qualifications this season. The rollout of GWN technology was another milestone, showcasing the advancements that continue to enhance our lifesaving capabilities.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the commitment of our volunteers. Your dedication—on the beach, in administration, training, and mentoring—is the backbone of this organisation.

I extend my gratitude to the North Queensland Councillors for their support throughout the season, working alongside the board to deliver key initiatives. A special commendation also goes to the North Queensland Board of Directors, many of whom stepped into new roles this year. Their leadership and dedication to member development

are shaping the future of our branch. Thank you to the staff of Surf Life Saving Queensland for their continued support of surf lifesaving in the regions.

Education and Training

Education is at the heart of what we do, and James, our Education and Training Supervisor, has led a highly successful year in coordinating and delivering vital courses. From Bronze Medallion training to highly entertaining scenario based advanced first aid and rescue skills, our members have benefited from a centrally coordinated approach to award training. James has been fundamental in researching and costing emergency response gear and equipment, in support of our Region being well prepared to assist emergency services, when required.

Membership and Community Awareness

Kaz, our Membership and Community Awareness Coordinator, has worked closely with club members and directors to grow our membership and strengthen our presence in the community. Through targeted engagement programs, a priority club focus, school visits, and public awareness campaigns, we have seen a notable increase in new members and community support. Our Nippers program continues to thrive, introducing young members to the values of surf lifesaving while fostering future generations of volunteers. Our surf lifesaving youth programs have been incredibly exciting, offering our young members valuable pathways and opportunities for growth.


Administrative Support

The grant supported the Raising of the Flags at the start of patrol. This year we raised the Red & Yellow Flags with the Australian, Aboriginal and Torres Straight Island Flags.

Cairns Airport Ironman Cairns and Green Island Swim we have set the standard for the best and most organised water safety service with over 70 volunteers from 5 clubs coming together.

Northern Youth Southern Experience (NYSE), our youth experienced surf lifesaving on the Gold Coast

Surf Life Saving advancing the Emergency Response (ER) Capacity beyond the flags with funding to support gear and equipment, swift water training, drone training, an ER

The State Club Captain & CTO conference in Port Douglas attended by members from 58 clubs across Queensland.

We aim to further develop our lifesaving services and operations, expand training opportunities, increase surf sports development coaches, focus on nippers being all about a fun experience and build community engagement north and south of our region. LIFEGUARD **SUPERVISOR**

What a big year of changes and events it has been!

1. North Queensland's First BOM (Beach Operations Management) Course

A major milestone for the region, our team successfully hosted North Queensland's first BOM (Beach Operations Management) course. Participants from the North Barrier region joined us for this valuable training opportunity. The course provided a comprehensive foundation, enhancing skills in Search and Rescue (SAR) and other vital beach operations. We are excited to make this course a regular part of our training schedule, with the second session planned for July.

2. Onboarding of New Staff and the Addition of Two TAE Trainers

In our efforts to strengthen and expand our lifeguard team, we welcomed several new staff members, bringing fresh energy and valuable skills to the service. This expansion has been essential in maintaining well-patrolled beaches and ensuring a robust response capacity. The new recruits have already completed rigorous training and have made a significant impact on beach safety, upholding high service standards year-round.

Additionally, we have two new TAE (Training and Assessment) trainers in our team. Their extensive experience has enabled us to refine our training programs, resulting in a more structured training schedule. These trainers play a key role in preparing our lifeguards to effectively handle a wide range of emergency situations while keeping them up to date with the latest training.

3. Hut Upgrades

This year saw the completion of much-needed upgrades to all our lifeguard huts. These improvements included new flooring, fresh paint, and roof repairs. The only remaining hut requiring attention is at Trinity Beach, which is scheduled for repairs and elevation by the end of this year.

4. GWN Radio Rollout

The rollout of the new GWN radios has proven to be a major success. Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with reports highlighting clearer communication and ease of use. While we have encountered some initial teething issues, we are addressing them and are now benefiting from the consistent performance of the radios.

5. Cyclone Jasper Recovery

The beach foreshores continue to be vulnerable following the impacts of Cyclone Jasper, having endured significant stress from king tides and strong winds throughout the year. Several locations remain in the process of full recovery. However, despite these challenges, we have successfully adapted and continued to provide consistent lifeguard services across all affected areas.


These highlights reflect the dedication of our team as we continue to evolve, develop and enhance the quality of our service.

LIFESAVING SERVICES & SPORTS COORDINATOR NQ

I commenced my employment with SLSQ in the role of Lifesaving Services and Sports Coordinator NQ in August 2024. The beach carnival season started the weekend before at Mission Beach with a picture-perfect tropical weekend. I watched everyone working together to make the carnival a success. I knew then that I had made the right choice in joining the surf movement as a paid employee. I commend and acknowledge the work that all members devote to make our Nth Qld clubs what they are, especially those members who go above and beyond expectations.

The 2024 patrolling and carnival season progressed with few incidences and has wrapped up, well done everyone. We are now rocketing towards the commencement of the 2025 Far North Queensland season which kicks off at the beginning of April.

Last season I was pleased to be involved with lifesaver training across the branch. We finally got the long awaited RWC (Rescue Water Craft – Jet ski) course underway and now have some capability with RWC on patrol at Etty Bay and Cairns Clubs. 2025 will see further role out of RWC courses for patrolling members and Ops Support.

My role in "Sport" and "Lifesaving" has enabled me to be apart of many aspects of our branch. As a volunteer I have continued to train, assess and patrol, and as a paid employee, I have been able to interact with clubs to help them move forward and continue to meet their patrol contracts. I am working with the Surf Sports team to enhance our coaching and officiating capability. I feel that as a branch we are working well as a team to meet our core goals of patrolling our beaches and developing sport in our branch.

2024 saw NQ branch further develop and implement their Emergency Response capability. NQ branch has a fully equipped Emergency Response trailer including a designated Emergency Response IRB. We were able to showcase this at "operation deluge" where we worked alongside the SES and QPS in Trinity Inlet to hone our emergency response skills. The combined effort of our members, resources and utilisation of assets from within the branch provided a great response to the scenarios provided during this activity.

Each club now has an endorsed emergency response team. Further training for these members should be rolled out during 2025. Some upcoming courses are Swift Water Rescue and U25kg UAV (Drone) pilot. If you have an interest in being part of the Emergency Response team in your club, please reach out to your Club Captain or President to register to be apart of Lifesaving beyond the flags.

Finally, A big thanks to the Queensland Government and QPS for the sustainability grants that all our clubs accessed successfully. This funding was used to purchase necessary equipment and services to keep us training lifesavers and making the beaches we patrol safer



for everyone. Funding was provided for NQ branch and Cairns club to replace old IRB motors, Cairns club is also using some of the funding to replace worn out PFD's. Funding was granted for Etty Bay's Starlink services and partial funding towards a new IRB. The sustainability grant will be used for club administration support at the Mission and Ellis Beach clubs and partial funding was granted for an IRB for Port Douglas SLSC. Lastly, funding has been provided to replace damaged shade sail posts at Ellis Beach after the flooding Cyclone Jasper brought.

I look forward to being apart of Lifesaving and Sport Services into the future and assisting each and every club grow and develop to form their integral part of our branch make up.

I encourage all existing and new members to keep up their good work and dedicated involvement. Without the effort that members make we would not be able to facilitate our everyday commitments, let alone provide additional Lifesaving support opportunities that are a necessary part of living in this region.

With this roll out we have managed to be able to do share agreements with the lifeguard service which has had benefits for all parties involved.

There has been another option added to how first aid and advanced resuscitation courses can be delivered. These two courses can now be combined into a two-day course. The first day will be online theory while the second day will be all practical assessment, allowing for a full day of hands on which will be great for our members. By the end of the course members will have their CPR, first aid and ART.

The roll out of the new Government Wireless Network (GWN) radio system has been a great success with feedback being there is much better reception, less dropouts and much clearer communication.

As I said at the start my tenure as Director of Lifesaving was short. I felt I had too much on my plate and felt the branch needed to be better represented. Jesse Glutz has stepped up and is now the Director of Lifesaving for the NQ branch. With Jesse attitude, compassion and commitment to patrols, his club and now the branch, I feel the branch is in very good hands moving forward.

YOUTH STATE TEAM

The 23/24 Season kicked off with the selection of the youth state team at the North Queensland Branch Championships held at Etty Bay. The team, comprising the branch's strongest 39 athletes aged 11-15 years, was chosen.

Following the northern season, the team committed to an additional six months of intensive training leading up to the Queensland Youth State Championships, initially planned for Burleigh Heads on the Gold Coast. The coaching staff devised a comprehensive program that utilised various venues including the Cairns Wake Park, Lake Tinaroo, and Mt. Whitfield.

During this training period, the team had the privilege of participating in the Kamana project led by Iron Women Harriet Brown and Lizzie Welbourne. They received valuable insights on female participation in sports, nutrition, and performance mindset.

The team attended Burleigh Heads a day earlier than in previous years for familiarisation with beach and surf conditions. This allowed the team to experience the expertise of high-level coaches such as Jon and Taj Anderson from Burleigh Surf Club, as well as Iron Persons TJ Hendy, Ben Carberry, and Brielle Cooper.

The Carnival location was moved in the days prior to commencement from Burleigh Heads to North Kirra Beach. This led to readjustment by team management for arranging the transport of athletes and equipment to the new venue locations.

Our Athletes adapted and throughout the competition weekend, the team showcased outstanding performances, in what was described as difficult and hectic conditions. Despite this, the team demonstrated outstanding results, making the finals in several disciplines, and achieved beach medal wins.

Special recognition goes to Halle Cygler and Lacey Taylor for clinching Gold in the U12 2x500m Beach Relay event, and to Ella Mayes and Lauren Baldwin for securing Bronze in the U13 2x1km Beach Relay event. Halle Cygler also won bronze in the U12 1km.

Other notable results include Cooper Hudson for an outstanding 5th in the male U14 Ironman, Charlize Gee finished 7th in beach flags. Both Teams entered the All-Age Relay, secured a place in the final and finished in the top 8. The senior team showed enormous pride in the Green and Gold, participating in the March Past which resulted in a very credible top ten performance. EDUCATION **AND TRAINING**

2024 was a massive year for Education in North Queensland.

It all kicked off in February with a the first of the new Silver Medallion Patrol Captain course running with the theory/online component being a joint North Barrier Branch and North Queensland Branch workshop. We were able to combine forces and get a great mixture of learnings and perspectives from across the two regions. The practical assessments at Palm cove also cause some excitement among the locals with some great acting skills from some of our members for the scenarios.

Running at the same time as the SMPC was also a couple of ART courses. These had a great turnout as well, meaning we had several members trained up and ready for the start of season.

Mission Beach were the first club to run a bronze course with training running through March, and assessments being finalised on Good Friday (first day of patrol) meaning 4 new Bronzies were ready to go.

From there it was all systems go for patrols but also training. Cairns and Ellis kicked off some bronze training in April, as well as our first branch IRB course for the season, starting at Tinaroo Dam. It was quite cold up there but everyone who came along had a great time and learnt plenty.

The rest of the year it all continued with SRC and Bronze courses at all clubs, a second IRB course that started with a big weekend at Etty Bay and even 3 drone courses at Port Douglas, Ellis Beach and Etty Bay with members from all 5 clubs participating.

In June, I was lucky enough to attend the Lifesaving Development Program at Magnetic Island and do a fair amount of training/ assessments with the next generation of lifesavers from across the state. It was great to see the passion for the surf movement from everyone that attended.

In August I attended the National First Aid Trainers Conference in Cairns, which gave me some great learning opportunities which I am able to bring back to NQB.

September saw Exercise Deluge take place in the Trinity Inlet. We were invited, along with SES, QPS and ARRFF from Cairns airport, to participate in the excise to better build our Emergency Response capabilities. It was a great multi agency exercise.

In October, I was invited to bring a couple of members along to some TACMED training workshops being run in Cairns. This was a great opportunity for a couple of our ECT TAFs to learn some new skills and hone those skills they already have. It was a very messy couple of days.

Also in October was Restart a Heart Day where we were able to offer free compression only CPR training to the public to try and make sure as many people know how to Send, Push, Shock and hopefully be able to save a life one day.

The IRB training got a makeover nationwide and a new training package was rolled out from SLSA. The NQ region was the first in the state, if not the country, to have all our IRB TAFs through the upgrade training and able to deliver the course to the region. Well done to our IRB TAFs for getting stuck in to get it complete.

Skills maintenance also had a few changes last year with a Branch Skills Maintenance calendar being rolled out so members could plan when to attend around their busy schedules and also go to other clubs to complete it. There was overwhelming positive feedback for this and we will be aiming to do the same in 2025.

In November, we had 170 odd members from across the state come to beautiful Port Douglas for the CTO/Club Captain conference. So many of them were amazed at not only how beautiful our region is, but also how we conduct training up with the risks we have within the water. There wasn't many who wanted to get in the water at all.

Membership

I am excited to say it's been an actioned packed year for NQ Membership and Community Awareness in 2024.

There were many memorable achievements in Membership during this season with one highlight being the focus on our NQ Clubs Junior Activity Programs. We kicked off the season with a NQ Branch Family Fun Day which involved an Aquarium visit and BBQ at Cairns Lagoon. The benefits this training provided our Age Managers was evident with their confidence on the beach and in their roles during the season. We continued our commitment to developing our JA program by supporting our JAC's with a trip to the The Gold Coast in November. The aim of this JAC Development program was for our JAC's to attend Coolangatta SLSC and Palm Beach SLSC nipper sessions and experience a Nipper program on a larger scale. Taking in the opportunity to observe the operations and to develop their knowledge in beach layout and training programs. Unfortunately, they experienced heavy rain and nipper sessions were cancelled, however they had great engagement with Club JAC's, each other and learnt valuable knowledge they can implement in their clubs 2025 JA Program.

In April 2024 Bridget Greensill was nominated as NQB Director of Membership and Youth. Working with Bridget we refined the NQ Youth program (NYSE) to implement a Lifesaving focus. In September we headed to the Gold Coast to stay at Palm Beach SLSC with 17 NQ youth from Port Douglas, Cairns, Ellis Beach and Etty Bay. During the program the youth experienced a development session with Carol Fox, Surf Lesson, team building initiatives and responsibilities, visited the SOCC, Westpac Helicopters, Race One, patrolled on SEQ beaches, attending a Nipper session at Coolangatta and were lucky to attend the SLSQ Awards of Excellence in Brisbane. With a strong focus on Lifesaving, pathways, opportunities and connecting with other youth in the branch the program was a great success.

Other memorable achievements to mention was supporting our clubs with the SLSQ Priority Club program and action plans, MEALS Conference in May, 2024 Sign on Day, Cassowary Coast Careers Day, Cairns Region Careers Day and JCU Market Days, Peninsula School Sports Spectaculars, NQ Branch float in the Cairns Regional Council Festival Street Parade and a Port Douglas Carnival Beach activation. It has been a pleasure supporting and working with Nicola Williams, DoJA and Bridget Greensill, NQB DoMY, Clubs and their members to enhance their membership experience.













Community Awareneess

Community Awareness or Awareness in the Community? This is a conversation I had a lot in 2024 in relation to what are we trying to achieve and the answer is essentially both. As a Community Awareness staff member we provide education and promote awareness of beach and aquatic safety whilst also promoting awareness in our community of Surf Lifesaving and the many benefits of being a Lifesaver.

The reach into our NQ communities grew in 2024 with engagement in U'8's Days and Beachsafe Presentations held at Schools, Libraries, Day Care Centres and OSHC. It was exciting to have new schools involved in beach programs and welcomed Newman Catholic College, Cairns Home Education and Mission Beach Rainforest Schools to our Practical Beach programs. Little Lifesavers School Holiday programs were held at Cairns Lagoon in January and April then moved to the beach at Palm Cove in July.

In March I had the privilege of travelling to Thursday Island to deliver a Water Safe Schools program at the local aquatic centre. This was a great experience to engage with the local community and educate the children in aquatic safety. Locally, we conducted a Water Safe School Program at Woree Aquatic Centre with MacKillop Catholic College and look forward to seeing this program develop further as schools embrace the importance of educating our children on aquatic safety.

With support from the SLSQ CA team we delivered a Water Safe Seniors program at Port Douglas and Yorkey's Knob in June. This is a lovely program aimed at educating and engaging our senior community members in Surf Life Saving. It was rewarding seeing the participants gain confidence in the surf, making new friendships and hearing their stories over a cuppa following the program.

As part of the NQ Branch First Nations Sport and Recreation Grant we conducted an eight week afternoon Beach Safety Program at Yorkey's Knob with 10 participants. The program was conducted with the assistance of Marc Harbrow Mentoring who transported the participants to the program following school. It was a rewarding experience to see the confidence in the children grow over the program as they gained skills in dolphin diving, boards and rescues.

With the growth of NQ Community Awareness in 2024 I was pleased to welcome some of our local club members to the Community Awareness team, Hannah Bissett Cairns SLSC, Mia Buls Ellis Beach SLSC, Deb Mullins Cairns SLSC and Bailey Pearson Cairns SLSC to our NQ CA team. I hope that NQ CA will continue to grow into 2025 and beyond to provide an important pathway for our youth members whilst providing important safety messaging to our community.

YOUTH & MEMBERSHIP

Being the Director of Youth & Membership is a great honour and a role I plan to fulfill to my best ability. To be leading and supporting our youth to become the future leaders and role models of our Branch is a great priviledge.

As this season end and another begins, I would like to reflect upon what has happen over the last season in 2024/2025.

NYSE CAMP:

NQB NYSE Youth Development Program to continue in 2025 on the Gold Coast with proposed dates of travel from Wednesday 24th September to Monday 29th September 2025. This was subject change depending on start of patrol season 2025. The 2024 camp was a great success with all participants fully engaging in all activities. From the 2024 camp we have widened the selection criteria for participants. In 2025 we will also welcome participants who hold Observers, Radio and First Aid certificates as well. This will allow for a wider range of participants to apply.

20 pax, 10 males,10 female

Participants are to hold a SRC or Bronze, Observers, Radio and First Aid and be **14 years and above.**

4 Chaperones, (2 male,2 female, 1 Coordinator) Chaperone would ideally be Club YDO's but if they cannot attend EOI will be sent out for parents with Bronze or SRC to attend.

This year we will continue with a similar schedule to 2024, with some extra inclusions.

Accommodation - Palm Beach SLSC dorms

Flights - Return flights to Brisbane and then train down to the Gold Coast.

Transport – Buses on loan from Tallebudgera Surf Club

Focus is on Lifesaving Development and pathways.

We would like to give the youth an experience of Lifeguarding at Southbank and also include a visit to Surf House for a morning tea with staff and meet key figures in Lifesaving in QLD.

Once again our camps are only successful if the participants are willing to engage fully within the experiences. All our clubs should be proud of the kids who attended. We have some great leaders coming through.

YOUTH PATROL:

2025 will see the first NQB Youth Patrol with Youth from across our 5 clubs in our branch.

We would like to offer the youth the opportunity to visit another club and patrol at a different beach for a weekend or a day as per the club patrol requirements. The patrol will camp at the club overnight for the members to engage and to be ready for their patrol shift. During the overnight camp we will engage them in fun team building activities aimed at building camaraderie, developing problem solving skills and enhancing their Lifesaving skills, ie. first aid scenarios.

How will the patrol work?

For each Club patrol the youth patrol will be under the supervision of the Patrol Captain of the visiting Club and be given responsibility of radio communication, assisting with setting up beach equipment as per patrol and beach requirements, raising flags and moving during patrol if required, first aid equipment check, stinger drags, writing and updating beach report and partaking in training scenarios during patrol if



applicable and any other Lifesaving activities as required by the Club or Patrol Captain.

How will we engage the youth?

EOI to our youth members for the Youth Patrol, once all submissions are received, we will coordinate a roster/s with Clubs and youth members.

As a pilot program for the 2025 season, we would like to aim for 3-5 club patrols dependent on budget allocation, members on patrol and club patrol shifts, not all patrols may need to be overnight, some may be able to be collected in the morning and returned home following the patrol shift.

We envision Bridget Greensill (NQB DoMY), Karen Smith (MCC) and the Club YDO Officer (in that region) will attend the Youth Patrol and will work with the clubs to ensure that all Awards are covered to comply with Patrol agreements.

And finally, as I have worked with all the clubs over the past patrolling year, it has become apparent that the Youth of our region need a voice. At our first surf carnival at Mission Beach we will be holding our first Youth Forum. This is a very exciting time for all our kids as this will be the beginning of our very first Youth Council. All YDO's will be invited to participate in this event. We have also invited Alex from SLSQ to be part of our first forum.

What will this look like?

YOUTH FORUM:

NQB Youth Forum from across our 5 clubs in our branch will be held at our first surf carnival at Mission Beach. We would like to offer the youth the opportunity to participate in a forum to identify and create a youth council specifically looking at retention, skill development and youth opportunities. Youth will be invited to participate in discussions around programs that are offered state wide as well as Branch developed and club developed. Youth will be encouraged to join in sessions that will focus on lifesaving leadership as well as Youth Excellence program.

How will the forum work?

This will be held at the first carnival at Mission Beach Club.

We would come together as a group on Saturday afternoon and into the evening. The agenda will be available 2 weeks prior so that all Youth/Youth Development Officers/ Director of Membership and Youth/ Membership and Community Awareness Coordinator are able to attend and participate.

WHAT OPPORTUNITIES WILL THE YOUTH GET?

The Youth will be invited to start a discussion around setting goals within the Youth space within their club and Branch. They will be encouraged to voice where they believe the direction of Youth within North Qld Branch should be heading and how are we going to achieve these goals. They will also be invited to nominate to be part of the Youth Council that will also meet with Branch Board on a monthly basis.

Youth will be given the opportunity to learn about ongoing state and regional programs within the 2025 calendar and what the expectations are if they attend any of these programs within the calendar year.

The outcomes from this forum would be the retention as well as identification of youth coming though the clubs gaining their Observers, Radio, FA, SRC and Bronze qualifications as well as becoming involved in the leadership development within their clubs and taking on Junior Club Captain roles as well as stepping into Deputy roles within their clubs.

If a club was to identify a junior member to participate in a State Youth Forum or program this would be fully supported through our ongoing budget and grant allocation.

Once again I would like to thank the Youth Development Officers who have come onboard in 2024 and early 2025. We will be meeting regularly to discuss ongoing projects, programs and all things Youth and Membership throughout the year. Another massive thankyou must go to both Karen Smith-Marron and Jen Rees. Without their guidance and ongoing support I certainly would not have had such a successful year.

To the Youth of our branch. You need to be excited about what is coming. If you see a program you want to attend please reach out to your branch. If you want to complete a certificate course speak to your YDO and most of all KEEP ON PATROLLING. See you all on the beach!!



DIRECTOR OF **JUNIOR ACTIVITIES**

2024/2025 was a season of learning and rejuvenation for the NQ Branch Juniors' Board. New leadership came with Shaun Taylor (Cairns), Carl Schneider (Ellis Beach) and Paul Lardi (Mission Beach) with me as Director, Nicky Harty (Port Douglas) and Mark Nucifora (Etty Bay) remaining on the Board from Last season.

We Kicked off the season with a nipper fun day that was held at the Cairns Aquarium and Cairns Lagoon. Although the rain did not hold off, this day saw just under 100 nippers from all five clubs come together to celebrate the start of the season. We ticked off some education around the aquarium with a treasure hunt. After collecting our treasure, we made our way to the Lagoon for further activities and a sausage sizzle.

NQB MEALS was the next item on our agenda the workshop held in March, with ideas and knowledge shared, to help our JAC's and others attending, gain a better understanding of the JA role and an overview of all that Junior Activities (JA) encompasses. It was timely as it started our season well and we all gained a lot of knowledge and understanding for things not only JA but in the wider lifesaving community as well. The MEALS forum was well attended and had representatives from all 5 clubs.

The Branch saw an increase of 17% in memberships in the Juniors Section. Port Douglas having a 32% increase, Ellis Beach had a 73% increase, Etty Bay had a 33% increase and Mission Beach with a 24%. Unfortunately, there was a decline in membership at Cairns of 21%. The overall member retention rate in the Branch of 67% was extremely pleasing.

The clubs continued to educate and develop their Nippers via surf play, participation, and fun. The education pathway via the delivery of the Surf Education program and awards ensures that our youngest lifesavers become knowledgeable in both lifesaving and surf sports.

As part of continuing development, we ran the first Age Manager Development Clinic. This clinic saw Ella and Joel Kinneally attend and impart their wealth of knowledge onto our Age Managers to better equip them for the season. The session on Saturday was held at Etty Bay SLSC and then on Sunday at Cairns SLSC. Joel spent full days down on the sand and in the water giving firsthand and practical experience and knowledge to all the Age Managers whilst Ella spent time developing the knowledge of the Age Managers on navigating the Nipper App. The Feedback was overly positive with Age Managers feeling more confident in delivering the Nippers program for the season. This is a clinic that we will run yearly to further develop the capabilities of our Age Managers.

As part of the Junior Development Activities Programs, Nippers are given the opportunity to gain a Junior Development Award each season. A total of 363 age accreditations and awards were gained in 2024/5 by our junior members, this includes age awards and SRC/bronze for the under 14/15 age groups.

Of the Junior members who completed their Surf Rescue Certificate, all have carried out patrol and water-safety duties during the calendar year, across their respective club beaches, at Junior/Nipper training sessions and at triathlon events. We also saw several parents receive their age manager and observer awards to assist our nipper programs.



Surf Sports is always a major component in the development of our nippers. Our clubs hosted five (5) carnivals in 2024/25 season, (with a few of the clubs also delivering green cap activities at this time), two (2) Pool Rescue carnivals, (catering to all the competitive age groups within nippers) as well as Champion Lifesaver. All seven Carnivals were well attended and nippers gained good experiences across the board.

A highlight of the junior surf sports program is the NQB Youth State Team. This season was no exception. The team did us proud, with outstanding performances from members making semis, to finals, and becoming state medallists. Congratulations to all on firstly your selection into the NQB YST and secondly for your attitude, behaviour and performance when representing the NQ Branch.

A change this season came with the use of the Nipper App. This was used was used by JAC's and Age Managers to assist on the beach and signing off age awards. There is great potential with the app and is aimed at making life a little easier for all involved in junior activities. It took a good part of the season to get used to using this platform with all clubs utilising it by the end of the season. Thank you to everyone for their patience and understanding with the few minor hiccups that were, thankfully, all sorted out as soon as possible, I look forward to supporting you all next year to continue using this platform.

To finish off our season we organised a Junior Activities Coordinators Professional Development trip to the Gold Coast. All 5 clubs were invited to send their JAC's or a proxy to attend this development opportunity. Mission Beach, Cairns and Ellis Beach JAC's attended and embarked on a wealth of learning. The JAC's attended Nippers' sessions at Palm Beach Surf Lifesaving Club as well as Coolangatta Surf Lifesaving Club immersing themselves in the Nippers' program. The JAC's also had one on one training opportunities with the South-East Regions JAC's. During our trip we attended Race One for an educational tour, as well as Surf Comm to gain valuable knowledge of the inner workings of Surf lifesaving. The trip, although wet, was a success, with our JAC's returning armed with some valuable knowledge that will lead them into writing amazing nipper programs next season. We have an annual educational trip planned.

A huge thank you goes to SLSQ and NQ Branch staff, Club JAC's, Age Managers, Team Managers, Water Safety, Coaches, Uniform Officers, Chaperones, JAAO's, Trainers, Assessors, BBQ helpers, Amigos, Fundraisers and Patrolling Members, for quite simply, without ALL OF YOU our Junior Activities and programs would not be possible.

Further gratitude to those members who have gone above and beyond this season and there are so many of you who contribute to running a JA program regardless the size of your club. I also extend my congratulations and very best wishes to those members who have been nominated by their clubs for NQB Awards of Excellence; in particular for the U14 Junior Life Saver of the Year and the Andy Frizzell OAM OBE Services to Junior Activities Awards.

I wish the incoming committee all the very best for the 2025/2026 season. Things are already looking bright following recent club AGMs being held, with new and old JAC's joining us and some exciting events and workshops already planned. Membership drives, together with come and try events, school visits and more are already showing promising signs of a ripper vear ahead.



After another successful year for the SLSQ North Queensland Branch, I have the pleasure to present the Audited Financial Statements for the year ending 31 December 2024.

Outgoings/Expenses:

Outgoings were primarily related to the operational and capital costs of undertaking programs such as the Surf Carnivals, Pool Rescue, Northern Youth Experience (NYSE), Youth State Team (YST), Insurance (\$5,775), Depreciation (\$10,367), Repairs and Maintenance (\$10,526), Equipment Purchases (\$13,025), Training Services, Awards of Excellence, etc.

Contributions (\$17,055 net) were also distributed to the Clubs for water safety support to the Ironman Event and Green Island Swim.

Key Financial Impacts in 2024

A one-off SLSQ operating support (\$14,254) in addition to some good grant outcomes and operational efficiencies mostly lead to the positive outcome. The Disaster Preparedness Grant of \$15,136 was received in late 2024 and this is forecast to be expended in 2025 on disaster related gear and equipment, noting also that some other grants, and NYSE and YST programs (due to the lead-up and timing) straddles over multiple years.

It has been a pleasure to work with the Board throughout 2024 and be part of the many great outcomes that the Branch along with the member Clubs have been able to achieve.

Report on the Financial Report

Notes to and forming part of the accounts

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial requirements of the Associations Incorporation's Act. The committee has determined that the club is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis, and are based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of noncurrent assets.

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

(a) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue, grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

(c) Property, Plant and equipment.

Property, plant and equipment are included at cost, independent of committee's valuation. All assets, excluding freehold land and buildings, are depreciated over their useful lives to the association.

These Notes must be read in conjunction with the attached Auditor's Report which form part of these financial statements.
