Club Captain Insights: The Reality of Leading a Surf Club

The Reality of the Role

- You're not alone. The Club Captain isn't expected to do it all. Surround yourself with good people and delegate.
- **Clarity is key.** Members need to know what your role is, how decisions are made, and how they can get involved.
- **Be a people leader.** Eliza checks in on patrols, runs group chats, and makes sure people feel supported and included.
- It's emotional too. From managing incidents to celebrating wins, Club Captains deal with highs and lows have a support network.

Juggling Work, Life & Club

- It's not a 9–5 role. Eliza balances full-time work with club duties sometimes replying to emails at 10pm.
- Ask for help. From her retired dad doing gear audits to uni students chipping in don't be afraid to lean on your network.
- Set boundaries. Volunteers aren't always available and that's okay. Set realistic expectations for communication.

Delegation is Survival

- You don't have to do it all. If someone has an idea, ask them to lead it!
- Share ownership. Giving members autonomy helps them grow and might uncover future leaders.
- **Succession starts now.** Passion leads to leadership when people are empowered early.

Motivating All Ages

- From teens to retirees. Clubs are full of diverse people give them flexible ways to contribute.
- Meet people where they are. Some just want to patrol. Others want to lead. Support both.
- Use experience wisely. Encourage older members to mentor, and younger ones to bring fresh energy.

Advice for New Leaders

- Back yourself. You won't have all the answers, but you'll figure it out.
- Learn before you lead. Don't try to change everything in year one observe, listen and build trust.
- **Test ideas.** Just because it's your passion doesn't mean it fits right now.
- Think long-term. Big goals (like Club of the Year) take seasons of planning.
- "Not yet" > "No." Respect ideas, even if you can't action them straight away.

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
